PUBLIC APPROVAL NECESSARY

A well-known publicist recently spoke of the opposition felt by the people of a town to a certain law. He then said that such a law was no reason for repealing the law.

This type of reasoning is typical of many reformers who seem to work on the principle that the best way to "do away with" crime is to make crime acts criminal.

No law can succeed without public approval. If there is public opposition, approval of the public becomes, in theory, certain.

The anti-proliferate laws are a good example. There are unquestionably hundreds of thousands of citizens who own small arms, for local statutes. The American people have never taken kindly to inquisition of constitutional rights by modern legislation.

There is a certain type of crime, the abundance of law, our legal technicians, and the antics of reformers and sub-sisters. The clever criminal who actually sees the inside of a prison is the exception, rather than the rule.

A great body of experts has said that under the laws are simplified and our judicial procedure is based on common sense. The legislation, we cannot hope to successfully cope with the underworld.

The moral is plain. It is time we stopped passing laws to interfere with the rights and liberties of our citizens and turned our attention to the real criminal. It is a commentary on legislative ineptitude, with gang murders and robberies going on in the face of the law, that the reformers of their time trying to devise ways to make it impossible for honest citizens to own guns.

THE OLD TIGER IS 88

Living quietly at his home in La Verne, where he was born, Georges Clemenceau, the Tiger of France, turned 88 years old on September 28, has almost dropped out of sight of the world in which he was one of the most commanding figures nearly ten years ago.

His life has been a long and eventful one, a statesman of France, particularly during the World War, are well known, few perhaps are aware of the fact that he once sought for refuge in the United States.

Educated for the medical profession, he came to New York, in 1855, at the age of 24, and became a practicing physician there. He was later appointed world-wide fame, although he met with reverses on several occasions.

SPEED IS THE THING

Marvelous was the discovery that sound travels faster by telephone and radio, their mere transmission would be of little value if they traveled only with the speed of ordinary sound.

To illustrate: If one were in San Francisco and desired to talk to someone in New York and had a voice loud enough to be heard that distance, it would take nearly four hours for the message to cross the continent. For sound travels only 720 miles an hour.

But, fortunately, electrical and radio impulses travel with the speed of light, which for all practical purposes is instantaneous for terrestrial distances, or about 186,000 miles a second.

Incidentally, it may be mentioned that so far the highest speed is attained in radio conversation ever carried on by a regular toll customer was from San Diego, California, and Stockholm, Sweden, a distance of 8,500 miles. By special arrangement longer distances have been covered.

Many improvements in telephone and radio communication will be made in the future, but there will be no increase in speed. Unless the sounds are transmitted with the speed of light, the speediest thing in the universe.

WHY EAT AN ORANGE?

In fact, careful analysis shows that the average orange possesses one hundred carbohydates. Two of these are fat, and the remainder ninety-one carbohydates.
