THE GREATEST WOMAN

For several weeks America has been honored by a visit from the greatest woman scientist the world has ever known, Mrs. Marie Curie of Paris, with who late last, Pierre Curie, discovered radium in 1898.

These great souls seemed to profit by their discovery, and gave it to the public for the benefit of humanity. Much of their epochal work in physics and chemistry was performed with meager equipment; in fact, the husband never had an adequate laboratory up to the time of his death from being struck by a train.

He had risen to be chief professor of physics at the Paris University, and his wife succeeded him in that position in 1908. She finally acquired a suitable laboratory, but during the war gave all her precious radium to the government, so that at its close she was without any of the rare substance.

Madame Curie, in America, has given a gram of radium and presented it to her together with a sum of money. She gave the radium to be used at the Curie Institute of the University of Paris, and with the income from the journey also rented another gram for the cancer hospital, Warsaw.

During her present visit her friends have given her a second gram of radium, which will go to Warsaw to replace that which has been rented.

Mme. Curie has never had more than a modest income, and at times has been in straitened circumstances, but she has patiently, and with her notable scientific research, happy in the knowledge that she is serving mankind.

SHIPPING BY WATER

Renewed enthusiasm has been aroused among advocates of water transportation by the speech of President Hoover at Louisville last month, in which a comprehensive system for further inland waterway development was announced.

As a result of freight rates transportation has made great strides in recent years, with a consequent saving of millions of dollars in freight charges. Shipping on the Mississippi river alone now reaches more than 62 million tons a year, as against less than 30 million tons in the heyday of its steamboats of 40 years ago.

But the Middle West and Mississippi Valley await the construction of the Lakes-Gulf deep waterway in order that the commerce of the region may be fully developed. A Pennsylvania manufacturer, who has company paid \$8,404 in freight charges in sending a special train of 44 cars to Los Angeles, by routing them from Peoria to the rail and then by water through the Panama Canal to Los Angeles. With an all-water route, and as the Lakes-Gulf project would make possible, much larger savings could be made.

In other sections of the country similar opportunities for utilizing waterways are presented, and in most cases the cost of the proposed developments would be a most profitable investment for the nation, resulting in benefits to both agriculture and industry.

OLD TIME POLITICS

While the political parties are still waged with vigor, and are often engaged in wild and spectacular oratory, they do not compare in picturesqueness and enthusiasm with those of the old days.

Back in the nineteenth century the carnival parades were an indispensable feature of political activities, and were the chief presidential election. Unarmed marching bands, bearing kerosene torches, with banners and transparencies, and led by brass bands, sometimes made up processions miles long in the larger cities, while smaller communities held their parades on a lesser scale.

It was the custom for political leaders to enlarge upon the length of parades by their partisans, while deprecating those of the opposition. The late Vice-President Marshal once told of such a circumstance, in which claims of rival newspapers held a humorous

touch. A great parade was held in Crawfordsville, Ind., in behalf of the candidacy of Governor Hendricks, after which, Mr. Marshall says:

"In the morning the Democratic newspaper announced that it was the greatest torchlight procession ever seen in the city; that it took two hours to pass a given point. The evening Republican paper quoted that the same, admitted it was true, but added that the given point was Mike Mullheiland's saloon."

ARMISTICE OR PEACE

Another Armistice Day has been celebrated, the eleventh milestone passed since the guns ceased to boom on the battlefronts of the World war. So great was the relief felt by the world when hostilities were stopped on November 11, 1918, that the day has become one of the notable landmarks of history.

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Communities that have not known sweeping disaster have no idea of what the timely aid given by this great organization means.

Whether it be the unhappy whims of a typhoon, a West Indian hurricane, or a Galveston flood, a San Francisco fire or a Jacksonville fire, the Red Cross is always ready to give them aid and usually is the first on the scene.

A dollar will make you a member of this pre-eminent agency of mercy, whose roster is indeed a roll of honor.

WANTED A SAFE JOB

So rapid has been the progress of science and invention in the past few years that we are in a while someone predicts that we have about reached the peak of our development.

But these remind us of the government clerk in the Patent Office in Washington, who resigned, giving as his reason that inasmuch as practically everything that could be invented and patented had already been invented, wanted to go into some line of work which promised employment for the future.
