

Cuba Tax Books Out: Show \$5.89 Rate for Village

\$15.00 figure includes the Cuba community high school tax, which is paid in all districts outside of district No. 4.

Rates in Detail

The total rates used are obtained by adding the rates required to produce the taxes levied by the various taxing bodies, all of the rates were carefully given for estate limitations. In the village the total of \$5.89 is made up in the following manner:

Outside the village the rates are the same as for as the first six items are concerned. Specifically the township rate, outside of Barrington, is made up as follows:

State \$2.30
County Bond30
Taxes14
Road and Bridge25
Village24
Village Road26
Park12
School \$7.75

The above rate total \$11.50. School district No. 4 and the park district both extend beyond the limits of the village. Residents of the township outside of the village but within these districts must add to the \$11.50 total, the 12 cent park district rate and the \$2.50 school district rate to obtain their total, deducting if they are in school district No. 4, the 30 cent community high school tax.

Outside of school district No. 4 the following school rates should be added:

To produce the total tax of \$14.46, these rates are projected upon a valuation of \$2,207,500, as fixed by the county board of review and remaining unaltered by the board of equalization. This amount valuation is made up of \$1,000,000 for lands; \$900,000 for lots; \$250,000 for personal property.

The figures of January E. W. Miller were \$1,000,000 for lands; \$900,000 for lots; and \$250,000 for personal. Mr. Miller's figures were increased \$2,450 by the board of review.

Though suffering irreparable damage to her hull, the old Ironsides' best lower corner took place on August 19, 1812, when she encountered the British frigate Guerriere off the Massachusetts coast and defeated her after a terrific battle.

It was that fight which won for her the distinction the subtitle "Old Ironsides."

When today, the black hull of the 120-year-old vessel slipped back into the sea, it only served to emphasize what a means and how she saw a ship strike her during the Guerriere engagement and bounce back into the water.
