THE DEADLY AUTOMOBILE

The cost to the people of the United States of motor vehicle accidents in 1929 was more than \$500,000,000, according to the chairman of the traffic statistics of the National Street and Highway Safety Conference, J. H. Partridge, whose authority we quote, states that the number of fatalities in motor accidents last year, an increase of 8 per cent over 1928, and nearly double the number of deaths from that cause in 1920. And so far in 1930 the rate of fatalities is increasing.

The most fatal accidents are not a peculiarity of any particular section or of any class or size of community. On the whole, there are fewer of them in the large cities than in the country districts, but the automobile is the chief cause of the increase in motor accidents during the out-of-sight of a traffic policeman, with no signal lights to be obeyed, is much greater than in crowded traffic, as every motorist knows.

Statistics compiled by the Nebraska State Police Association show that about 70 per cent of the deaths from accidents in that state, where population is less concentrated than in almost all of the rest of the states and there are only two or three really large population centers, were 362 in 1929, an increase last year, of 123, disclosed in 3,650 automobile accidents.

Every victim of a motor accident is a victim of somebody's carelessness. Out of the total number of accidents in Nebraska last year by far the most collisions between drivers and passengers were the probable reason for a collision except carelessness on the part of one driver or both. Sixty-three of the dead in Nebraska were pedestrians struck by cars. Thirty-nine deaths were of motorists trying to beat a train across a railroad crossing. Sixty-four were killed while speeding. Twenty-four died in skidding accidents. Twelve deaths resulted from trying to pass another car, without swinging wide enough. Blinding headlights forced 127 cars off the road, killing ten persons. Twelve were killed by reckless driving.

The remedy for this increasing toll of death on the highway is partly in improving the roads, partly in bettering the cars and dangerous devices, but largely in a closer supervision of license to drivers. Today in a few states children, mental incompetents, cripples and irresponsible persons are forbidden to endanger the lives of others by driving cars. In most states, however, a good man can commit manslaughter by this means without restraint.

Walter Johnson, famed pitcher and manager of the Washington Senators, and while they particularly apply to the game of baseball, the principles enunciated are equally applicable to the game of life in general. Johnson says:

"Play fair; be on the level.
Have respect for discipline.
Never play for failure; accept the break of the game as they come."

"Grit your teeth and bear down when things look toughest.
Live cleanly.
Don't criticize fellow players.
Never quit!"

TEACH BOYS POWER USE

SLOT MACHINE CLERKS

Slot machines for vending a wide variety of merchandise are being introduced with great rapidity, one company alone manufacturing 10,000 of them a month, with an investment of 25 million dollars in this field.

Although coin-in-the-slot machines have been common for a long time, it is the extension of the idea to so many lines that makes them really new. The most notable example to the public is provided by the fact that many of them are set up under such means of protection that they give 24-hour service.

One drug store in Detroit uses no less than 100 slot machines, selling all kinds of cream, pastes, soaps, tobacco, and in fact all sorts of packaged products. There are others which vend soda, radios, entertainment, electric vibration, gasoline, cameras, goods, tea, coffee, and even eggs.

All this is the result of an idea originally employed by a manufacturer 40 years ago, when he engaged a carpenter to build the first chewing gum vending machine, which was at the time thought to be only an ingenious toy.

All this, however, is the result of an apparently significant experiment.

DOCTOR PRAISES PRESS

In the opinion of Dr. Bloodgood, eminent cancer specialist of John Hopkins University, the newspapers of the country are performing a splendid public service through the publication of health news.

He declares that due to the spread of sound information concerning the teeth, excessive use of stimulants and tobacco, 70 per cent of the patients threatened with cancer now seek medical aid in time to save themselves from the disease.

He also states that the public is less given to drink as a result of the information in the newspapers.

A department store in Loyal, Wis., with 1,250 population, does \$750,000 a year. The Big Store at Temple, Okla., with 1,000 people, does \$735,000 annually. Fred Man's store at Devils Lake, N. D., 1,300 population, does \$100,000 worth a year.
