Clement Umbdenstock, a former student of vocational agriculture at Elia township high school, was recently declared champion of the state of Illinois in 4-H Club work with his pure bred Poland China gilt project. This word came from the state leader of 4-H Club work, E. K. Fitchard of the University of Illinois.

Each year thousands of boys and girls from all over the state of Illinois compete for these state championships and to be state champion is indeed a high honor.

When Clem started to high school he studied animal husbandry and for a while he tried to raise pure bred Poland China hogs. He bought a pure bred gilt from his neighbor, John Mack, and started his project. Clem took the best of care of this gilt and fed her properly. Last year he won first in the county show and repeated again this year with another gilt. This year he was declared local and county champion, which gave him the right to compete for state honors, judged on the following points: a story of his project; a story of what benefit he obtained from club work; a neat project book which shows his record; and a recommendation from his local leader, S. H. Dorsey.

As a reward for his efforts Clem received a \$25.00 prize from Public Utilities of Northern Illinois, a medal of honor, and a trip to the national 4-H Club convention at Chicago, November 29 to December 6.

This congress is held during the time the International Livestock Show is in full swing, so Clem will be able to see the show and enjoy it thoroughly. Several banquets are scheduled and boys always enjoy them.

The record made by Clem certainly speaks well of the work of S. H. Dorsey, vocational Ag. instructor, is doing to Elia, Mr. Dorsey laid the foundation for the work Clem has done. Many other boys of the Ag. departments have made very good records in their projects and in judging work.
