## NATIONAL FARM GROUP EXPOSES FALSE ATTACKS

While the Federal Farm Board has requested a federal investigation of an "incidents campaign" against its activities, the Farmers' National Grain Corporation, cooperative agency sponsored by the board, has taken the defense on its own behalf, said a recent dispatch from Chicago to the Christian Science Monitor.

In making an expose of an attack against the Farmers' National, W. L. Stahl, director of publicity, said that though the organization would not attempt to reply to every criticism of its activities, every flagrant effort to discredit it would be run down.

In the case just brought to the attention of the public, grain elevators throughout the middle western section were being flooded with literature containing "vitae attacks" on the Federal Farm Board and the Farmers' National Grain Corporation, according to the latter's headquarters here.

Much of the literature, it was asserted, bore the name of the Illinois "Farmers' National" Association, and the signature of a reputed vice-president of the association.

Investigation proved that the use of the name of the Illinois Elevator Association in an "expose," the statement said. The name of the Illinois Elevator group is Farmers' Grain Dealers' Association of Illinois, and its president, C. H. Bonnell, of Orono, Ill., in a letter to the Farmers' National, makes clear the actual relationship between the author of these attacks and the Farmers' Grain Dealers' Association.

This letter stated that the association "has never authorized nor incurred any letter or statement criticizing the members or the policies of the Federal Farm Board and we respectfully desire that its name may be recalled."

"These activities being neither authorized nor incited, as Mr. Bonnell states, by the Farmers' Grain Dealers' Association of Illinois," continued the Farmers' National statement, "the question of who is financing these activities becomes a pertinent one for grain producers, stockholders and directors of farmers' elevators everywhere."
