EMPTY BANK BUILDINGS

For sale, a few thousand very attractive, modern, and in many cases, fireproof bank buildings, in best business locations. Who wants to buy?

For stockholders and depositors of closed banks, this is a real problem. In Barrington a fine bank building carrying on the asset ledger at \$19,000 and worth more is for sale. Like other bank buildings it is so constructed that without expensive remodeling, it would have only a few practical uses. It could be the home of another bank or of a building and loan association, but it would not be practical for a grocery store, a shoe store, a garage, a confectionery store, an apartment house, a restaurant or a cafe.

There is one other sound practical use for the building as there is for many of the closed bank buildings throughout the country. It could be remodeled economically into a United States post office. Barrington is on the list for a new post office, but certain federal laws and regulations permit the post office department to build but prohibits it from buying for use buildings already constructed.

There were good logical motives behind the passage of that law. One was the reduction in opportunity for graft in real estate transactions. Unsuitable buildings should not be sold to Uncle Sam at high prices by politically influential persons. Another motive was the opportunity for employment afforded by construction of new post office buildings.

With an empty bank building in each of a large number of municipalities which are on the promise list for a new post office, the construction law might be amended to permit the post office department to purchase buildings from bank receivers. The possibility of graft from excessively high payments for buildings could be minimized. The building values have been listed in the regular call statements for years prior to the dates the institutions closed and have been listed by the receivers since that time. The law could state that the department pay no more than the listed price. As for providing employment, the loss of that advantage to a community would be more than offset by the liquidation of frozen bank deposits. Some employment would be provided when the bank buildings were remodeled—at least as much as home building workers receive from the construction of entirely new post office structures. All work on new post office buildings is not done by local contractors and laborers.

TIME FOR SUMING UP

OUR WASHINGTON LETTER

EXTRA SESSION—It seems that the best efforts of the democratic house leaders to avoid the pitfalls of an extra session are foreshadowed. With important fiscal legislation rushed through in record time, the house now faces itself in a position where its plans may be checked by the senate. It is gradually dawning on leaders of both political parties to the congress that the budget-balancing on paper and in reality are horses of different colors. Despite the drastic slashing of expenditures for government operations, the matter of digging out the money to pay for various activities is providing grave concern here. Hence, the extra session may be charged with unsolvable task of providing revenues from sources which have been well nigh under taxation schemes of state and municipal authorities.

CHANCES of the senate passing a bill for revenue purposes have improved during the week. There is a general belief that President Hoover will veto the beer measure which would raise a special session. The death of former President Coolidge cast a pall over official Washington. Social functions which have an important bearing on politics and diplomacy have been cancelled for a period of 30 days. Flags at half-mast at the embassies and government buildings are a mute reminder of a nation's mourning. The passing of Coolidge will force the conservative wing of the "Old Guard" of the republic to change its plans. They had expected his aid in reorganizing after the debacle of November. Their main objective is to shove the Hoover clique now controlling party affairs.

THAT ORATORY and other forms of propaganda are golden only in the sense of being expensive to the taxpayer is clearly indicated in the printer's latest report. Despite strenuous efforts to economize printing has reached tremendous proportions. The cost of the government printing office may be glossed from an estimate showing it printing ordinary newspaper type the year's output of type would print a library of 612 encyclopedias volumes containing 200 pages each. The cost of congressional printing amounted to \$1,000,000 in 1932 an increase of \$200,000.

SENATORS Hiram Johnson of California and Borah of Idaho are listed as leading orators of Congress. THE DISCUSSION covers farm relief, taxation and amendments to the currency act. On February 8 the nation will be officially informed as to the choice for president and vice president. The electoral college will meet in solemn convocation and receive the certificates of each state's electoral votes. The returns are read by states and called in alphabetical order. It really is an empty ceremony but must be followed in order to meet the mandates of the constitution. The results were known on the evening of November 8.

Would Have Beer Sold Through Post Offices

Ex-representative James H. Kirby of Petersburg addressed the Springfield Y. M. C. A. Forum recently on the subject of "How Shall We Settle the Liquor Question?" Mr. Kirby is thoroughly conversant with the question, having made a study of both sides. He is the author of a book called "The Pending Crisis," treating the liquor problem from time immemorial down to the present time. Although Mr. Kirby had formerly been an ardent "dry," he is now advocating an amendment to the Volstead law, permitting 4 per cent beer and light wines, manufactured, transported and dispensed to the people by the federal government through the postal department at a minimum cost plus only enough tax to pay the postal deficit.

Wandering From This to That

Art for Children

Unique among the important art museums of the country, the Art Institute of Chicago supports departments of art especially for children. There is the department of the museum in the southeast corner of the building on the main floor, endowed by Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Worcester, which has a program of temporary exhibitions and permanent installation of objects of art especially for children. A curator is employed for this department. Miss Helen Mackenzie, who gives free lectures to children every Saturday morning at 2:30 gives special plays for children, there is the Children's Theatre, which every Saturday afternoon at 2:30 gives special plays for children. They are held in the beautiful Goodman Theatre at the southeast corner of the Art Institute building. Children may come to these plays and their parents may be assured that nothing of an objectionable nature will be presented to them.

Noisance Tax Results

The United States treasury yield from the motor excise taxes, on a basis of collections for the first four months, has been considerably below that anticipated when they were written into the revenue act of 1932. For example it was estimated that the current federal gasoline tax would bring in \$120,000,000. Collections for the first four months indicate that the total will be below \$100,000,000. The returns from other motor taxes have been equally as disappointing.

The estimate of collections from the tax on lubricating oil was \$23,000,000. The indicated yield is only about one-third of that amount, or around \$12,000,000. The taxes on automobiles, trucks and parts were expected to bring in \$120,000,000. On the basis of the first four months, the total will be only about \$13,000,000. The estimate of \$13,000,000 for the tax on tires and tubes, however, is being maintained. The unusually low prices on tires have, of course, been a large measure responsible for heavy sales.

University Cuts Budget

The University of Illinois, reduced by a million dollars its legislative request for operating expenses as compared with the operating appropriations made by the last legislature, President H. W. Chase announced.

"Salaries of the faculty and administrative staff will be reduced approximately ten per cent action of the board of trustees, as a result of a reduction of half million dollars in the budget," President Chase said.

The board decided to reduce this item as well as all other items which make up the biennial budget. Consequently the budget which the university will submit to the legislature will call for a total of only \$14,500,000 for the next biennium.

The last general assembly appropriated \$11,280,000 for the two year period, which included \$1,400,000 for the unit of the medical and dental building in Chicago. This money, however, was not used, it was explained, because of the state's financial condition, and, in addition, the university carried other expenditures so that a total of approximately \$2,500,000 of the appropriation will be unused. The university's savings for the present biennium, therefore, amount to more than 22 per cent of its total state budget.

Due to economies in the operation of the university during the present biennium it has already reduced its expenditures to practically the amount set in its legislative request for the coming period," President Chase said. "In order to do this, it has been obliged to operate on an emergency basis and it cannot therefore continue the present total for the next two years without a reduction in salaries."

Shared in America

The important part of the discovery of America shared in, according to the world's variety of foodstuffs is impressively illustrated by a new exhibit in the department of botany at Field Museum of Natural History. This consists of an assemblage of the principal vegetable products native to the New World, by means of which one is enabled to see at a glance which of the numerous vegetable and fruits in common use originated on the American continent, and, by exclusion, which did not.

The plant products shown in this exhibit were totally unknown in Europe and Asia until comparatively modern times.

Grain to Legumes

Good crop rotation put into force in the new January 22 at 10:35 a. m. Illinois farmers can take to heart getting a net income out of the 154 million dollars worth of new crops they are producing annually, according to P. H. Crane, of the soil fertility division, college of agriculture, University of Illinois.

Good rotation takes an added impetus for 1932 because low grain prices have set farmers to thinking more than ever about taking land out of grain crops and getting a larger percentage of it into legumes. Crane pointed out. No thinking period would involve serious handling the so-called surplus problem by lowering acreage yields, but changing rotation to produce larger crops of legumes is fundamentally sound, he said. Furthermore, he explained, farmers are on the losing end of a battle that will lower unit costs of production, improve the quality of their products and reduce long hauls from insects and other hazards.

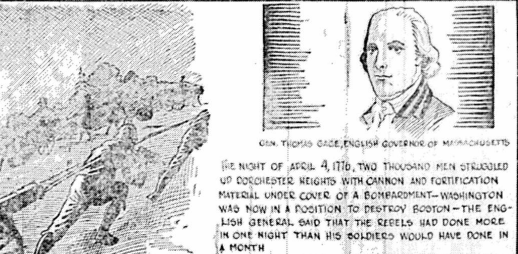

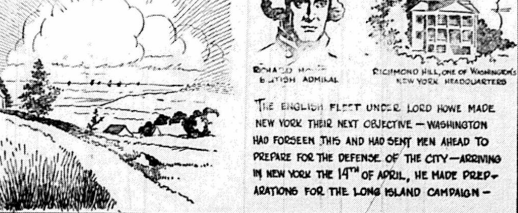

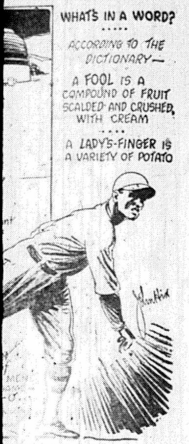

Hold Meetings to Plan New Drivers' License Law

About 50 persons from various sections of the state gathered at a luncheon meeting in Springfield recently to organize a state-wide committee to work enactment of a drivers' license law from the 58th general assembly. The meeting was called by C. L. Rice, president of the Chicago State Council and vice president of the Western Electric company, who acted as chairman. Twenty-six states have drivers' license laws, it was announced at the meeting, and their advocates claim the laws have reduced traffic accidents 31 per cent in those states. Illinois should have a drivers' license law modeled after the one now in operation in the State of New York.

Petrarch in Literature

Petrarch lived in the fourteenth century in the early days of the Italian Renaissance, and is remembered for the sonnets which he wrote in Italian and for his influence in reviving interest in classical antiquity. To the men of the Middle Ages this life seemed important chiefly as a preliminary period of trial before the day of judgment, and man's chief concern here was supposedly seeking salvation. Petrarch shared the intellectual curiosity that was common in the writers of Greece and Rome. Interest in this present life came to be a prominent characteristic of the Renaissance and of the generations since. It is because of his departure from the medieval ideals that Petrarch is now thought of as modern.

Charcot Ranked Among "Pioneers of Medicine"

The glances surrounding Charcot in his lifetime obscured the true value of his work and of the man himself. It is one of the ironies of life that it was his family work which, at the time, brought him worldwide fame and patients from every class of society, whereas his enduring, pioneer work was that of a highly technical character that none but specialists in his own field could appreciate its value. So writes Dr. Claude Lillingston in one of his most popular "Pioneers of Medicine" in Hygeia Magazine.

In his identification of a large group of nervous ailments with definite changes in the brain and spinal cord, Charcot attained scholarly achievement which assured him a permanent place in the ranks of great pioneers of medicine.

Highway System Can Not Help Airplane Pilots

In an opinion requested by Reed Latham, chairman of the state aeronautics commission, Attorney General Oscar E. Carleton, holds that the laws prohibit the commission from painting signs or markings on state roads. The opinion also forbids the use of the state highway police to enforce a system of markers on the highway for the benefit of airplane pilots.

Examine Orchards' System of Quarantine and Embargo

A standardized system of effecting quarantines and embargoes for the protection of orchardists and the nursery industry against blights is expected to grow out of a conference held at Memphis, Tenn., recently. Phil S. Hauer, Taylorville, state superintendent of plant industry, said that the results of the meeting would be of particular concern to nurserymen and orchardists, because of the plant peach disease which has caused great loss in southern Illinois.

Reorganize State Dept. of Livestock Sanitation

A proposal of agricultural leaders, who met at Chicago recently, to reorganize the state department of agriculture's livestock sanitation program will be laid before Governor-elect Henry Horner. The first goal will be to combine the office of superintendent of animal industry and chief veterinarian, with authority to revise and improve the department's control of animal sanitation.

Only Weak Characters Indulge in Self-Pity

Never complain. Let that be your leading principle. Self-pity is one of the worst habits any one can have. Unfortunately, innumerable persons have this evil habit, to their own and other people's misfortune. By pitying themselves, by continually pondering on their troubles and making a display of these in order to arouse pity in others, they increase their own sufferings without doing themselves any good whatever. Self-pity is sentimentalism of the most foolish kind, and is characteristic of the weakling. Just as dirt is matter in the wrong place, so is sentimentalism a feeling in the wrong place!

We are equipped with feelings that we may be activated by them to leave undone that which may be noxious, and so seek out that which will be advantageous. When we suffer pain, we should turn it to account by noting that something is going on which must be altered, and by setting to work at the instant to make the necessary change.

If, instead of doing this, we surrender to the pain, we are not true persons of feeling, but sentimentalists. There are, unfortunately, more sentimentalists than persons of true feeling, and in every one of us there is a latent inclination to sentimentalism. Almost all of us like being commiserated, are fond of indulging in self-pity, thereby doing ourselves more harm than we imagine.—E. Tietzen.
