Farming communities are without buying power, merchants stocks are low, trade is at a low ebb, credit is tight and naturally so because of low priced commodities. Communities, such as ours, will not regain their purchasing power until prices of farm products are boosted.

## HANGING SCARCELY MENTIONED
