A state finance department would be given the power to compel all local governments to submit for examination their budgets or appropriation ordinances before they are adopted and to insist on regular andits acceptable to the state department. Provision would be made for uniform account-ing systems and for developing unit cost standards for the various governments. Bond issues would also be approved

"For Cook county a special board of local finance would be set up to to-operate with the state director in regulating the fiscal actigaties of the municipalities within the county."

The present county board's failure to respond to the popular demand for lower taxes offers an additional reason for preference iof handling our own fiscal affairs through our elected officials and titizens committee. affairs through our elected officials and citizens committee which have been created in some of our communities.


