INCREASED LIBRARY DEMAND

Libraries were created by our democratic society in or-der that every-citizen might have throughout life the means of self-education.

More people used libraries, more books were borrowed alore people used libraries, more books were borrowed from libraries, and more books were used in library reading rooms in 1935; than ever before. Sample reports from 33 cities represelying only one-tenth of the total population of the United States show that the number of books borrowed from their libraries in 1932 was 81,663,423, an increase of 37 per cent sides 1929.

Economic and social insecurity have led men and women to attempt to understand through reading the fundamental and current publish which confront them as citizens. Books on the business of earning a living are in great demand. So also are the books of many kinds which contribute to the

also are the (Soks of many kinds which contribute to the maintenance of a spirit of hope.

Library expenditures are a small part of the public budget. With feet exceptions libraries have been operated without extravagance, with an intelligent regard to the public interest and the taxpayer's burden. It is nevertheless the duty of library administrators to re-evaluate the library's services in terms of presenticonditions, to distinguish sharply between essentials and non-essentials, and to seek new ways of carrying on the most necessary activities at the lowest possible cost.

U. OF I. CO-OPERATES

The public is demanding, not without justification, lower operating costs of its state institutions. Where these institutions have go-operated in an effort to lower expenses and have successed to a reasonable degree, the citizenry should be grateful epough not to add further demands which might prove impossible of fulfillment.

President Chase and the trustees of the University of

President Chase and the trustees of the University of Illinois have ruceeded in cutting operating expenses at that institution of plearning 30 per cent since 1931 and are now asking that ing further slashing be demanded at this time. The budget calls for \$3,905,000 per year or \$7,810,000 for the twolyar period. Two years ago the university was granted \$11,280,000 for the biennium although it will not take from the state approximately \$2,800,000 of that amount. This is the lowest budget the university has submitted for more than 12 years, although its present student enrollment and other responsibilities are far greater today. President chase stated, that a second salary reduction is necessary to mjet the reduced amount of his request, and the university has so pruned every item that goes to make up its budget; that any further reductions will be disastrous. "We haye made no provision whatever for contingencies," "no all@kances for inflation or any rise in prices, and no leeway for a student increase in enrollment."

ABOUT BANKING

No civilized country of modern times has suffered so cruelly from unscientific and inefficient currency and banking systems as has the United States.

This sen ence sums up a situation which everybody is determined to remedy. The wording bears exceptional authority, however, being the considered statement of Thomas W. Lamont Of J. P. Morgan and Co. Mr. Lamont proposes two vital chayges in banking practice. "No thorough-going banking refogns can be brought about until these changes have been accomplished," he declares in Collier's Weekly. "The first is to bring all the commercial banks of the country, small as well-as large, under the single ages of the federal reserve system." "The second," he says, "is to establish sensible provisions for limited regional branch banking."

Such reforms, brought about gradually, ought to begin to yield to the country some measure of banking stability. Mr. Lamont pines. For 125 years, attempts to develop a scientific banking system have been generally blocked by the country's deep-scated distrust of centralized banking, despite the success of such systems that provide the federal reserve system established.
