### CARELESS LEGISLATION

Within the last two years Illinois legislatures have enacted four liws which evidently were not thoroughly studied and reviewed in advance, because two of them later were thrown out by the supreme court as unconstitutional and two were found, to have glaring loop-holes which resulted in a great deal of inconvenience and expense and one of them in

actual suffering.

The two laws which did not fill the requirements of the actual suffering.

The two laws which did not fill the requirements of the state constitution were those designed to raise revenue by taxing incodes and retail sales. The two laws which left wide open loop-bibles were the hunting law of 1931 and the Finn Pauper act of 1931. The game law (without such intention of the lawritakers) left the season wide open on hen pheasants, wood blucks and other birds which previously had had the protection of a perfianently closed season. The pauper relief act clanged the care of the poor farm from a county duty to a fown duty. It closed the door to poor relief by the countiek far in advance of opening up a door for poor relief through the belowns.
