## 53,429 Bushels Wheat Quota for Lake County

Lake county rates an allotment of 53,429 bushels of wheat under the federal adjustment administration plan for wheat production according to word which Farmer-Adviser H. C. Gilchrist, has just received from R. R. Hudson, acting state manager in the extension service of the college of agriculture, University of Illinois. The allotment is approximately 54 per cent of the previously announced five-year average production of 99,220 bushels for the county. This is the percentage of the total national wheat crop which is consumed domestically as human food.

On the basis of these official allotment figures, cash compensation payable to Lake county farmers for wheat acreage from wheat production will total approximately \$15,000. It is estimated that the county will receive \$15,000. The bushel rate for the compensation payments has not yet been fixed. Two-thirds of the compensation payment to cooperating growers will be paid this fall, and the remainder, not over 30 per cent, will be paid in the following year.

The total amount of the compensation payment, which will be paid into the county in the form of ready cash will depend upon the number of wheat growers who take advantage of the opportunity to participate in the wheat program, it was pointed out.

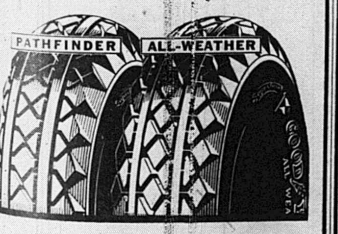

## Special Rulings on Sales Tax Given Out

Sale of building materials in connection with a large job contract is a sale at retail and taxable under the two per cent retail sales tax.

Under contract of this type, therefore, the contractor is the consumer and the person selling building materials to the contractor is making sale at retail, the price receipts from which are taxable.

which are taxable.

Beverage retailers, and other dealers who sell merchandise in containers, at retail, are not required to pay the two per cent sales tax on deposits made by patrons for the return of containers. J. M. Brade, assistant director Joseph J. Rie of the department of finance announces, "The refund of deposits on containers is a sale at retail, and the price receipts from the sale of the containers is not to be included, inasmuch as no title trans-

fers to the purchasers," said Mr. Brade.

Manufacturers of containers or packaging materials must pay the sales tax on all their products sold to retail purchasers who, when ordering goods sold to their patrons, do not make separate charge for containers. However, if a merchant does make a separate and distinct charge for containers, the tax on such wrapping materials sold by him, must be paid by the retail merchant, and by the wholesaler of these materials," the ruling concludes.

Retailers who sell tangible sales property on the installment plan pay the two per cent sales tax on proceeds from such sales only as they are received, according to an interpretation of the law, and the tax can be charged the customer on the installment plan.

Finance charges are of a service nature, but must be itemized separately if dealers desire to avoid the possibility of paying taxes on their receipts from this source.

Coal dealers selling at retail are not required to pay the tax on delivery and unloading services, provided these services are itemized separately.

Correspondence schools must pay the sales tax on the gross receipts derived from sale of lessons and materials to students. Sales of lesson materials to students outside of Illinois are not taxable, however, as these are sales in interstate commerce.

Music as Emotional Outlet

A Few Lines of Business Must Await Rulings in Trade Codes

Change in opening and closing hours for Barrington stores was decided by the majority of merchants in all lines except purveyors filling out, and industrial establishments to become effective Monday, Aug. 21, as announced in an advertisement on page 5 of this issue of The Review.

Police announcement to the contrary is made.
