## School Pupils' Vacation Days End Wednesday

Children of Kindergarten and First Five Grades to Report Tuesday

Barrington children will have to abandon their carefree habits and pleasures of vacation days and submit to the more strictly regulated routine of the classrooms next Wednesday morning, the beginning of the 1933-34 school year. This perhaps will not be met with ready submission by a few youngsters who think that the summer has not been long enough and that it should be extended to include a few more dips in the swimming pool or perhaps a few more trips to Enchanted Island, but the opening day will be received joyfully by many children who are anxious to get back to school to continue their education. All classes will begin Wednesday morning, Tuesday, Sept. 5, will be devoted to registration for those who are not already registered and to enrollment of the pupils in the kindergarten and first five grades. Superintendent Erman S. Smith has announced that the pupils of the lower grades will be taken care of on that day and children will be designated to their classrooms and seats, he said.

**Enrollment Tuesday**  
In order to expedite the handling of the pupils and enrollees in these grades the pupils have been divided into alphabetical groups to appear at different periods of the day. The groupings for the pupils for kindergarten and first five grades and the time which they should appear have been announced as follows: Pupils whose last names begin with A, B, C, D or E will report to their respective rooms from 8:30 to 10 a. m.; pupils whose last names begin with F, G, H, I, J and K will appear from 10 to 12 o'clock; L, M, N, O, P, Q and R from 1 to 2:30 p. m.; S, T, U, V, W, X, Y and Z from 2:30 to 4 o'clock.

**Supplies May Be Rented**  
The rental system adopted for these grades, though optional at the will of the parents, is \$1.25 for kindergarten pupils, \$1.75 for pupils of the first, second and third grades, and \$2 for fourth and fifth grade pupils. It is important that rental and enrollment be taken care of on Tuesday, Mr. Smith stated, as pupils must be prepared for a full day's work on Wednesday.

High school—8:15 a. m. to 12:15 p. m. and 1 to 3:15 p. m.  
Junior high—8:30 a. m. to 12 m. and 1 to 3:30 p. m.  
Kindergarten—9 to 11 a. m. and 1 to 3 p. m.  
Grades 1 to 5—Starting time 9 a. m. and 1 p. m. Dismissals from 11:30 to 12:30 o'clock in the morning. The regular dismissal time for the afternoon session will be 3:30, although some will be dismissed earlier.

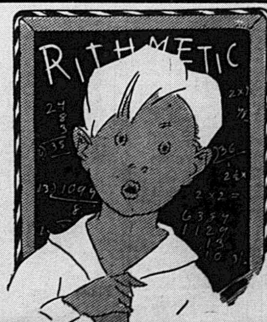

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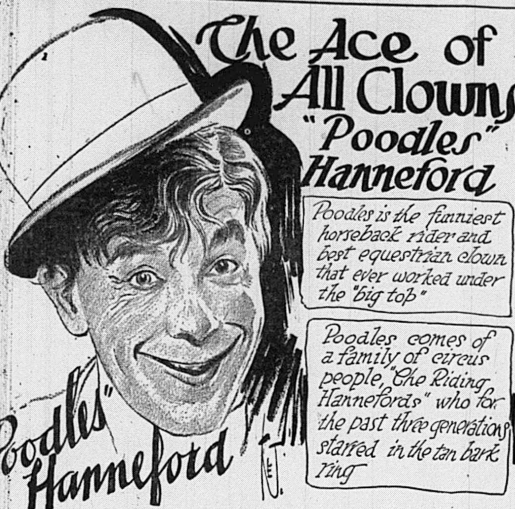
