NÄVY DAY—OCTOBER 27

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This day was selected on which to hold the annual observance of Navy Bay. Pilots are resjonsible for more than half of all airplane accidents in the United States according to the aeronautics branch of the defartment of commerce, as reported in the United States News,

Errors in judgment, poor technique, carelessness, negligence and disobledence of air rules are given as the basic causes for pilot liagility accidents. The first two may be considered as excussible, but carelessness, negligence and disobledence of the pilot greater according to the ac

Local people have often wondered why one rule is com-monly broken by gilots flying over the village. That rule is in regard to the ginimum altitude at which airplanes may fly over urban confimulties. Almost every week complaints are heard that only or more airplanes have passed over Bar-rington only a fe'y hundred feet in the air and sometimes as low as 200 feet in the air. These flights are dangerous to pilots, passengars and citizens on the ground. Persons seeing these flights should note the number of the plane if possible and send, a written complaint to the aeronauties branch of the depigtment of commerce.
