state is necessary to protect her from the strong communistic influences of Russia and of China, and she is using the state of Manchuria for such a protection.

For centuries China herself has been backward and docile where outside nations have been concerned. Almost every nation has involved her in unfair treaties and she has been blind to her position. But recently, since the Chinese revolution fostered by the great Chinese hero, Sun Yat Sen, she has become conscious of herself as a nation and has resolved against foreign influence within her borders and those of her provinces. A glimpse at part of the will of Sun Yat Sen—this man whom all China reveres—will reveal the new attitude toward existing conditions and the struggle for a better civilization and more justly treated Chinese.

Sun Yat Sen's Will

The will follows: "For forty years I have devoted myself to the cause of the People's revolution with but one end in view, the elevation of China to a position of freedom and equality among the nations. My experiences during those forty years have firmly convinced me that to attain this goal we must bring about a thorough awakening of our own people and ally ourselves in a common struggle with

## Additional Cost Due to Sales Tax Should Be Shown

Chamber of Commerce Gets Ruling From Department of Finance

The occupational sales tax should be shown on bills as an "additional cost on account of tax" but not under the heading of sales tax, according to a ruling of the state department of finance as interpreted by the retail division of the Illinois Chamber of Commerce. An open letter from the retail division follows:

"Efforts of the retail division of the Illinois Chamber of Commerce to convince the state department of finance of the merits of adding the sales tax as an additional expense have been successful. In light of the ruling as given below and on the basis of the information we have hitherto furnished to you as to the necessity of keeping the tax out in the open for various reasons may be set out on our list to follow the method long suggested by the retail division—adding the tax as a separate item and as an additional cost of doing business. Let's head every effort to make this initial ruling apply to the entire state."

"The ruling from department of finance has been given as follows: A retailer may advertise to his clientele that his listed prices are subject to a 2 percent increase on account of the increased cost of doing business under the retailer's occupational tax and make it at this time by way of a separate item."

"The retail merchants thus have the option of absorbing an increase in their selling price due to the increased cost of doing business under the act—and of showing it as a separate item. However, retailers must not hold out to their customers that they (the retailers) are agents for the state or that this is a tax on the customer. It must not be added simply as a tax but should be designated as an additional cost on account of tax."

"The ruling file in with continued efforts made by the merchants to insure payment of the tax as an additional and separate item—without penalty. It permits merchants with department assistance, to keep the tax out in the open. It does not force them to the impossible situation of trying to absorb the 2 per cent charge."

"We urge you to adopt the method of adding the tax," the reverent council added. "The procedure has been authorized and it is to the best interests of your customers and yourself to do so."

"The state department is to be congratulated on this much needed ruling. Merchants will unanimously appreciate it. Add the tax as an additional expense and keep it out in the open."
