Village to Apply for \$154,200 Loan to Separate Sewer

Engineers' Estimate of Cost Is \$7000 Annually for 25 Years

Application for a government loan of \$154,200 with which to build and separate the Barrington sewer system will be made by the board of trustees, according to a unanimous decision arrived at Monday night.

This decision followed approval of a plan for constructing the sewer system submitted by Counselor, Oliver and Quinlan and Carter Jenkin, engineers engaged by the village to do this work. The plan and recommendation were submitted by the engineers as follows:

"The entire program (building a disposal plant for a population of 2500 people with capacity of approximately \$154,200 with anticipated grant of \$37,000) thus making the net cost of the loan \$117,000 to \$117,000. This is the program we recommended. The annual charges for the loan of \$117,000 with payments extended over 25 years amount to approximately \$7000 per year. The necessary yearly service charge can be obtained by dividing this amount by the number of sewer connections."

Special Assessment Plan Regarding the alternative plan, payable in 25 years, the engineers reported: "Providing the work is to be done by special assessment an immediate government grant of only 10 per cent of labor and material costs may be anticipated. The other 90 per cent of the grant is to be held as a reserve guaranteeing payment by property owners of their assessments. Arthur O'Connor, now at Washington, interviewing the local and financial engineers, has found that the village is not eligible for a special assessment plan at present, and the terms for Barrington would probably be similar. Thus an amount of approximately \$12,000 would have to be assessed if the entire program were to be built by special assessment."

The first plan would actually be a loan of \$154,200 with interest to come in here and build a sewer and then will be no Barrington on a time payment basis. According to a tentative plan of the board, part of the annual carrying charges could be met by the village. The balance of the carrying charge would be met by service charge imposed on every house sewer outlet.

The engineering plan submitted includes a proposal to use all of the present sewer mains, use of the old sewer system, and a new sewer line to be built in the village. The total cost of \$154,200 would include the following: interest on the loan, \$117,000; engineering fees, \$10,000; construction of sewer lines, \$10,000; construction of disposal plant, \$10,000; and other expenses, \$10,000.

## Trapping of Fur Bearing Animals to Start Dec. 1

Acting director of the state department of conservation, C. P. Thompson, has called attention to the fact that the trapping of fur bearing animals in the northern and central zones of Illinois would remain in effect until December 1, 1933.

Heretofore, in the northern zone, the open season has been from November 1 to February 15, inclusive, and in the central zone, from November 15 to February 1, inclusive.

This slight change of date is vital to the preservation of this kind of game in the affected zones, according to Mr. Thompson.

Violation of the game and fish codes are punishable by fine, imprisonment or both.

"The most common cause of tularemia is wild rabbits," Dr. Jirka says. "The disease is not dangerous to humans, but it is a danger to rabbits. It is a long drawn out disease, leaving its victims usually dead after a considerable period of suffering from one to six weeks."
