The way a good many people are talking about the so-called Recovery Program, one would think they expected some sort of a system which would relieve everybody of respon-sibility and which would run all business without regard to

That's nonsense, of course; nevertheless, there are a lot of people who still do not realize that any system, like any machine, has to have men to operate it.

The success of the administration's program will depend entirely upon the quality of the men who head up the business enterprises of the United States. In other words,

In other words, there isn't going to be any change from the ancient truth that every institution, whether it is a rat-trap factory or a railroad system, is the lengthened shadow of a man. Owen D. Young, who uses his brains to about as good advantage as any man we know of, pointed out that what broke down and caused all our economic woes, was not human beings, but the system, under which business and public affairs were administered. What is being done now is to try to change—and improve—the system, but it will still take men to run it.

We have an idea that young men growing up in the world of business and affairs from now on will find just as great opportunities for self-expression as anyone had under the old system; but as things point now, they will operate the system very much more for the benefit of everybody and very much less for the bonefit of a few individuals.

We find that many men who were thought to be entitle selfish in their point of view are accepting the idea that any scheme which works for the benefit of the entire social group is far better than one which benefits some but not all. Under the old system it was inevitable that there should be inequalities and injustices. Newspaper publishers in the smaller cities and towns are resentful of a wise crack from Prof. Rex. Tugwell, one of the president's brain trust, reflecting upon them.

The professor made this statement:

"While national magazines, good metropolitan dailies and radio networks carry many fraudulent and misleading advertisements, by far the most flagrant abuses are found in movie magazines, mail-order catalogues, educational and religious journals, cheap fiction or 'pulp' magazines, small dailies, country weeklies, and on small independent stations, as well as direct mail advertising."

In answer to this sweeping assertion, the weekly newspaper editors are calling attention to their nation-wide campaign in recent years to eliminate from their columns, false, and misleading advertising. Look through the advertising columns of the Storm Lake newspapers, for instance. You'll find them free from advertisements of questionable nature. It is a matter of pride, in our business office, that this condition exists. The old day of fake advertising has long since wanished, so far as the country press is concerned.

Professor Tugwell doesn't know it, apparently, because we doubt if he ever made the acquaintance of the weekly papers now being published. We don't know whence he came. But he falls under the general criticism of the boys in the eastern cities who are trying to regulate conditions in the "wide open spaces" of which they know little or nothing.

This condition exists in thousands of the offices of the weekly newspapers. And one of the duties of the lows Press Association office at Des Moines (and other state and national press associations) is to investigate doubtful "ads" and issue warnings to the mem-bers of that organization against any that would be deceiv-ing to the public.—Pilot Tribune, Storm Lake, Iowa.

It is time for the President to use the prestige of his office and the indisputable hold he has upon the American public to check this struggle. The situation calls for leadership, and leadership is concentrated as never before in one man. It calls for political courage, but no more than it took to face the Legion and hit out from the shoulder. Labor, like the Legion, should be called upon to drop all pettiness and co-operate for the national good.—Business Week.
