

Mr. Sexauer warned that any move by the state to reduce the return farmers are getting for milk, would have unfortunate results, and suggested two possible plans for solving the problems of overproduction and demoralized markets.

The first would be to draw up a marketing agreement covering the entire milk shed, guaranteeing equity among producers as to the price received and equity among distributors to create competition in efficiency, rather than merely competition in buying milk cheaply.

The second, and more permanent solution, is that farmers in the region affected form an organization, or organization large enough to actually sell the milk for producers and hold surpluses off the market. Mr. Sexauer said that in the local situation, the dairymen's league would be glad to work with such an organization to form a sales corpors tion which would distribute fluid sales between the various tion which would distribute fluid sales between the various

These suggestions deserve attention—and they should be watched by farmers in other parts of the country. They may point the way to solving problems with which all producers are faced, and which must be eliminated if agriculture is to go forward.
