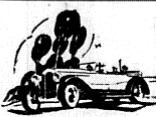
Studies Burn

P.M.A. Directors Told to Withdraw From Federal AAA

400 Farmers in Stormy Session at Grayslake Thursday Night

Four hundred dairy farmers of district 7 of the Pure Milk association meeting at Grayslake last Thursday night, directed the directors of the district organization to withdraw from the AAA which sponsors a code including small loans to distressed farmers, the slaughtering of hogs, and the regulation of crop planting. Each of these affects the established dairymen unfavorably; the first through maintaining of surplus production and supply, the second by reducing demand, in great deal of milk to be fed to hogs, and the third tends to raise the price of feed thus boosting the cost of doing business.

Another resolution adopted at the meeting, as predicted in The Review last week, urged a price of 12.5¢ per hundredweight during such a period of time as the price of feed is affected by the drought.

A third resolution demanded that the directors of the PMA adopt no policies which will encourage production of surplus of milk.

In asking for 12.5¢ per hundredweight (an increase of 5¢ cents) the farmers were definitely stating that this would be for only such a period as feed prices remain high, because of the drought.

It has been predicted that the result price of milk in Chicago and nearby communities will be increased one cent in the near future to cover anticipated increase to the producer.

The most active part of district 7 of the association is that surrounding Lake Zurich, and the majority of dairymen living in this and the towns are members.

It is Kelsey, a director of the PMA and chairman of the Lake county board of supervisors, was chairman of the meeting Thursday night.

Chicago Man Breaks Neck Diving at Bangs Lake Sunday; Dies

An emergency operation failed to save the life of Robert Bartneck of Chicago whose neck was broken when he dived into shallow water at Bangs Lake near Waukegan Sunday. Mr. Bartneck was said to have dived into the lake immediately after being dined and was under the water 15 minutes before rescuers could find him to shore. He was revived with artificial respiration and rushed to St. Theresa hospital where x-ray pictures showed his neck had been broken. He died Monday afternoon and following an inquest Tuesday in which a verdict of accidental death was returned, his body was taken to Chicago for funeral services and burial.
