Des Plaines Bank Scrip for This

Depositors Could Receive 10 Pct. of Claims in Scrip

Plan Used in Des Plaines Will Be Offered to Local Merchants

An issue of merchandise scrip amounting to \$20,150 backed by a 10 per cent dividend from the First State bank receivership, was offered to depositors in the bank if the majority of merchants and artisans in Barrington agree to cooperate in a plan similar to that in operation at Des Plaines and accept the scrip in payment of their merchandise claims.

Edward Sloan, assistant deposit receiver of the group of Des Plaines banks which includes the First State bank, was in Barrington Monday explaining the plan proposed to several of the local merchants. Mr. Sloan and F. J. Pines, president of the Des Plaines Clearing House, association, will appear before the Barrington Merchants club Monday, Nov. 12, to explain the plan in detail and to obtain the necessary approval of the plan.

The plan is in brief as worked out in Des Plaines follows:

A scrip clearing house is formed as a downtown office established on a full time, voluntary basis, or elected to take care of it. Then all persons who have deposits in the closed bank are permitted to assign to the clearing house their claim to the clearing house in exchange for credit which can be used to pay local bills of merchants, and to receive from all stores and individuals participating in the plan. The plan is entirely optional with each depositor, who may assign 10 per cent of his claim for credit and immediate purchasing power or he may leave his deposit claim intact and not participate in the plan.

The merchants who accept the scrip as money can pass it along to other merchants in payment for personal goods they need to buy. They can use it as part payment to clerks and as part payment for rent, etc., depending on the willingness of employees and landlords to accept it. The Des Plaines Clearing House will accept the scrip in payment of their bills.

Cash From Bank

When the bank receiver declares a 10 per cent dividend to depositors, he turns over cash to the scrip clearing house equivalent to the amount of all deposits assigned to the public during the month of November.
