Snake Spots Poisons

The snake which splits poison is the Egyptian splitting cobra. The name of this splitting appears to be that of common cobra poison glands the poison is forced out through the fangs and at the same time a tube of air is exhaled. This carries the liquid forward as a spray in a considerable distance. If it hits your eye you may go blind, intense irritation is set up which results in temporary and sometimes permanent blindness.

Stamp Collectors Value

Old Christmas Seals

The Lake County Tuberculosis Association has recently received an article concerning the value of old Christmas seals which will be of interest to stamp collectors. The seal first originated in the United States in 1907 when Emily Howland used it as a means of raising money for a tuberculosis sanatorium in her state. The 1907 seal is not valuable, however, as the 1911 issue which was made up to coils for use in an automatic vending machine. They are listed at \$15 in stamp catalogues.

The 1913 seals are listed at \$15 while a variation of the design is worth only half as much.

Certain designs of the years 1914-1916 are worth \$5 each, a dozen of 1916 \$3 and one of 1912 \$1 each.

Collecting of Christmas seals has grown to such an extent that collectors have formed a society known as the Christmas seal and Charity Stamp Society. Collectors in all parts of the world belong to it.

The seal this year shows a picture of "The Little Red" field tuberculosis sanatorium established in the United States by Dr. Livingstone Trudeau.

Chest clinics are supported by the sale of seals which are sold before Christmas every year.
