POSTAL SAVINGS VS. BANK DEPOSITS.

There are still many people who believe in the fallacy that in depositing their surplus cash in postal savings it will be safer than in a local bank. That may have been true at one time, but now with mearly all banks operating under the Federal Deposit Insurance plan, postal savings as well as any other form of government banking, or investment are just as safe but not a bit safer than local bank deposits

In his annual address to the Minnesota Bankera' association, D. J. Fonquette of this city, president of the association, pointed to the advantages of local bank deposits in the

ronowing:

"A. The depositing public is unquestionably confused
in regard to our stand. As a result, they are not making
proper use of our banks and are still making a large part of
their deposits with the postal savings system.

"Few of the millibns who regularly deposit their funds

with the postal savings system are aware that by doing so they are aiding and abetting a system which is sapping the life blood from their own communities. Many of these people mould not patronize sich a system if they knew that when they deposit with the postal savings system their funds become unavailable as a basis of credit in that community. I do not believe that the government is deliberately attempt-ing to compete with our banks. I do not believe that they are seriously urging anyone to deposit with the postal savings rather than in a bank! I believe the fault lies more with us as bankers. What are we doing to inform people that banke today offer a degree of safety comparable to the postal savtoday orier a degree or sarety comparable to the postal sav-ings system with an influent rate slightly greater and the added advantage that modey deposited in the bank is avail-able for credit to local business as business justifies the ex-tension of such credit.—Sentinel.
