### Discount Offered for Full Payment **Real Estate Taxes**

Advantages in Taking Care of Bills Locally Are Pointed Out

Cook county taxpayers can save one and two-thirds per cent on the second installment of their 1933 bills by paying them in full promptly, John J. Plagge, deputy collector pointed out this week.

The 1933 bills which were maintenance of the country taxes payable in two fastallment: and the country taxes payable in only one installment. The first installment is due now, and the penalty date is January 1. The second installment on real estate taxes is due before May 1, 1935.
