Lecture on Christmas Trees Fluorescent Local School Children Wednesday

Mrs. Charles Sherman of Chicago gave a series of delightful lectures concerning nature study at the Barrington public school Wednesday morning and afternoon under the auspices of the Barrington Women's club. She addressed children of the lower grades, Wednesday morning and higher grades and high school pupils that afternoon.

In describing pine and fir trees, Mrs. Sherman told her audience a balsam fir makes the ideal Christmas tree since it retains its needles longest.

It can be recognized by the base of the tree, grey in color and having small blisters on the trunk which give of a resin when broken, she said. It is also aromatic at right angles on the branches.
