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

an indication of their fine professional spirit.

"Your board is to be commended for the excellent work which has been done recently upon your building. I suggest that before long you investigate the matter of treating the floors of your building with a good seal. There are several good seals now upon the market. The seal should last for several years but will have to be waxed occasionally.

It is unfortunate that you were unable to do away with the position of remedial teacher in the elementary grades. I think you should replace this teacher as soon as your financial condition will permit to care of the pupils who do not make normal progress with the regular instruction.

"Also it seems to me a school system of your size needs the services of a trained nurse, for at least part-time. A nurse may be expected to make periodic physical inspection of all pupils, watch for signs of contagious disease, call at the home of children who are out of school on account of illness, do the follow-up work in seeking to have physical defects taken care of, give health talks in the school rooms and in general promote the physical well-being of all pupils.

"You are to be congratulated for your recent purchase of maps, one of the best collections of maps in the country. Illinois is one of the best states to live in.

"I trust that you will make a liberal appropriation in your budget to keep reading material, reference books, maps, etc., up-to-date.
