CIVIL SERVICE TRAINING

From time to time, classified advertisements are published in The Review by correspondence schools which offer courses for civil service training. Whereas correspondence school training plays a worthy role in the field of education, students should not be misled into believing that any course of training, whether offered by correspondence schools, high octions or colleges can guarantee government jobs as a re-ward. A student who has successfully completed a good course of study designed to fit him for civil service employment, should have a better opportunity of passing a civil service examination than one who has had no preparation or study for the work. But his correspondence school certificate will not give him a "pull" with Uncle Sam.

FOR CRIME LAW IMPROVEMENT

Proposals for a complete change in the administration of criminal law in the United States, putting all the courts on a basis exactly like that of the present juvenile courts, will be urged on the next conference of governors by Judge Joseph Siegler of New Jersey.

Judge Siegler's recommendations are based upon a personal contact with 11,000 juvenile cases and 18,000 domestic that the property of the property o

"This plan," he says, "represents the greatest advance
in criminal jurisprudence in 500 years. As far as the courts

If we continue our present system we chall go on building more and more jails and prisons, at enor mous expense, and filling them with prisoners who are merely students in crime, going there for post-graduate courses."
