attire and is open to every person residing in Lake county. Cash and merchandise prizes will be awarded to successful entrants in six divisions of exhibits. In each division are awards for various types of exhibits.

All exhibits must be entered by 10 a. m. Friday. Exhibits may be brought in any time after 4 p. m. Thursday. During the program, scheduled in the auditorium on both days, exhibit rooms will be closed to visitors. No premiums will be awarded by judges when none of the articles are considered worthy. All articles in the household science department must be strictly "home made."

Farm exhibits have been divided into farm products, such as grains, vegetables and fruit; poultry, pigeons, rabbits and waterfowl. The exhibition of articles other than listed above will be appreciated by those in charge.

Culinary exhibits, Mr. C. Seelinger, chairman, is divided into exhibits on breads, cookies, cakes and pies. Domestic art, Mrs. G. Groves, chairman, has quilts, spreads, rugs, novelties and mending exhibits.

Floral shows, Mr. Harold Hays, chairman, is a county ranking contest and is open to all women and girls in the county. Each entry shall consist of a pair of jars, one quart of water and one of vegetables. These entries must have been canned prior to September 1, 1934. Each jar must be labeled on the bottom with the name of exhibitor, address and county. The pair of jars winning first place at the county will be eligible for entry at the annual state fair.

Canning entries are divided into canned meats, vegetables, fruit and other miscellaneous varieties in nature of pickles, relish, jam, preserves and jelly.

Displays in the flower exhibit are open to every variety and arrangement. Cut flowers, flower arrangement, dahlia arrangement, table centerpieces, house plants, shadow boxes and miniature bouquets.

Prizes will be awarded to winners of the house dresses exhibit, Mrs. J. L. Clements, chairman. These entries are to be cotton home-sown garments.

An interesting feature is to be the exhibits display, Mrs. Paul Allanson, chairman, for persons owning anything of unusual nature or construction. Any person having a hobby is urged to display his work with any information that he may have concerning the exhibit. No prizes are offered for this feature but the many unusual angles should make it very popular.

Additional information on exhibits may be obtained from any of the acting officials or from J. L. Clements, principal of Elia township high school.

Supreme Court to Hear Appeal on County Clerk Suit

The battle for the county clerk's office in Lake county continues in the law courts with Lew Hendee holding the chair and Russ Alford seeking to out him by a writ of mandamus.

Hendee filed a petition last week asking the state supreme court to review the matter.

History of the case goes back to the last county election, November 6, 1934. At that time the election board issued a certificate of election to Hendee, who held office. Alford contended that election judges had returned tabulations in Deerfield and Avon township giving him a majority. When the ballots were certified by the election board Hendee was declared winner in both townships.

A writ of mandamus was issued by the circuit court declaring that Alford had been elected. Hendee then appealed to the appellate court where the decision of the lower court was upheld. He is now asking the supreme court to dissolve the writ. Regardless of the decision returned by the supreme court a recount will probably be asked as both the republican and

democratic organizations have petitions on file.

Official returns for the county last November gave Hendee 18,551 votes and Alford, 18,535 or a margin of 16 votes for Hendee.

The Hendee-Alford contest is the second dispute growing out of the November election. Bart Tyrrell, democratic candidate for sheriff, contested the election of Sheriff Lawrence Doolittle but a recount showed Doolittle was winner by 72 votes.
