## W. L. O'Connell Offices Moved From Des Plaines to Melrose Park Bank

Notice has been published this  
week that the offices of William  
L. O'Connell, receiver for the  
closed First State Bank of Bar-  
rington, have been moved from  
Des Plaines to the First State  
bank building in Melrose Park.  
Louis E. Nelson has been ap-  
pointed to succeed H. E. Robert-  
son as deputy receiver for the  
First State Bank of Barrington  
and seven other closed banks in  
this vicinity.

According to Mr. O'Connell this  
move is made in the interests of  
further consolidation and econ-  
omy. All offices are being combin-  
ed and assistants to receivers are  
being removed. Mr. Robertson  
resigned his duties over Lake  
county banks.

No statement has come in rela-

Chief Baade reported that he is  
to have a large force of men pa-  
trolling the streets and has issued  
a warning that anyone found guilty  
of vandalism will be held in the  
local jail overnight subject to  
payment of damages.

demic have been noticed, parents  
are asked to keep a constant check  
on their children's health.

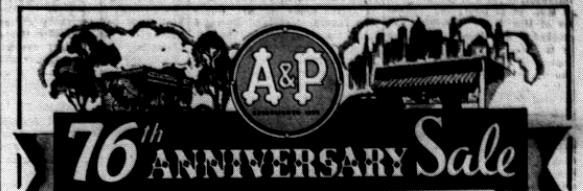

## Low Hendee Loses Election Appeal in Supreme Court

Suit to Vacate Mandamus  
Writ Favoring Russ Alford Denied

The Illinois supreme court Wed-  
nesday denied the petition of L.  
Hendee, Lake county clerk, for  
an appeal from the circuit court  
ruling that dismissed his election  
contest against Russ Alford. The  
supreme court refused to grant a  
writ of certiorari.

Hendee has been unsuccessful  
in attempting to withhold the  
ratting of Alford as county clerk.  
He had carried the case through  
the circuit, appellate and supreme  
courts.

Beginning at the origin, Hen-  
dee was issued a certificate of elec-  
tion after the election of Novem-  
ber 6, 1934. When the ballots  
were certified in the Lake county  
house by the election board, Hen-  
dee was declared winner.

Alford went to the circuit court  
and obtained a writ of mandamus  
with the contention that the  
clerk of Duwield and Avon had  
given him a majority of votes ac-  
cording to election judges in those  
townships. Hendee appealed the  
appeal to the supreme court where  
the ruling of the lower court was up-  
held. He then went to the su-  
preme court of Illinois where his  
appeal was denied Wednesday.

According to reports Alford is  
now to take office. Undoubtedly  
Hendee will ask for a recount of  
the votes as he has a petition on  
file.
