CLOSING IN ON AGRICULTURE

Where are those expanded foreign markets and safely steeted domestic markets that the New Deal promised the American farmer?

What has become of the promises held out by Governo Franklin D. Roosevelt to American agriculture in his Topeks Ka., speech, when he was running for the presidency? And again in his Sioux City, Iowa, speech? And again in his Seattle, Wash., speech?

Under the policies of Franklin D. Roosevelt, as carried out by the agricultural adjustment administration, plus the reciprocal tariff agreements, the American farmer has all but lost his foreign markets, and is beginning to lose his domestic markets by virtue of increasing agricultural im-

The report of the bureau of foreign and domestic commerce for the month of September, this year, gives compara-tive figures (undergeneral headings) for the first nine months tive figures (undergeneral headings) for the first nine months of this year and the first nine months of last year. These figures show a decline in the value of exports of animals and edible animal products in the first nine months of this year, as compared to the first nine months of 1934, of \$17,691,000.

The decline in the quantity of exports of meat products for the same period amounted to 70,191,000 lbs.; lard, 290,-620,000 lbs.; wheat, 16,573,900 bs.; wheat flour, 596,000 bbls.; unmanufactured tobacco, 73,831,000 lbs.; raw cotton, 590,412,000 lbs.

The value of exports of vegetable food products and preparations for the same period declined \$11,306,000.

That shows the speed with which American agriculture is losing its foreign markets under the New Deal.

Now for the record of how it is losing its domestic markets. Imports for the first nine months this year, as compared with the first nine months of 1934, show an increase of 41,835,000 lbs. of meat products; 21,304,000 lbs. of butter; and 26,650,000 lbs. of fish.
