Local Individuals Named in \$30,000 Civil Damage Suit

Civil suit for \$30,000 on two
counts was filed in the superior
court of Cook county against John
Toman, sheriff of Cook county,
United States Fidelity and Guar-
anty company, Charles Elmer and
Paul Magnuson of Barrington.
Plaintiffs in the case are Bert and
Emma Beckman, Mr. and Mrs.
Beckman were former residents
on a farm south of Barrington but
now live in the village.

The two counts claim an illegal
dispossession, loss of valuable
goods, filing of bankruptcy and
loss of equity on notes on a farm
under a trust deed.

Sheriff Toman is alleged to have

lost and damaged personal property in act of disposing of the

plaintiffs, as tenants. The United States Fidelity and Guaranty com-

pany, a bonding company for Mr. Toman under Illinois statute, is

named as liable for damage resulting from those alleged losses.

Charles Elmer is named as re-

ceiver of property and as an in-

dividual. Paul Magnuson is named

as cooperating in plan to dispo-

sess Beckman and gain possession of the farm.

The plaintiffs claim that they

were tenants of a farm on which

they held equity by notes and

that they rented the farm from

the daily appointed receiver by

verbal lease. They state that ef-

forts to pay rent to the receiver

were not accepted.

During the dispossession period

they claim they were forced

into bankruptcy by acts of the in-

dividuals and receiver. They also

claim that efforts were made to

gain control of the farm for sale

to an individual or individuals

unknown to the plaintiff.

The plaintiffs are represented

by the Taylor, Cuttore, Partridge

and Parker law firm of Chicago.

Hearing of the case is not ex-

pected before next fall.

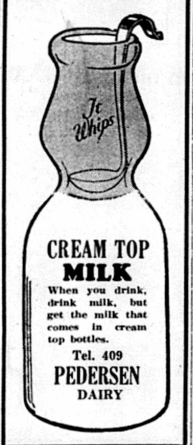

Pomeroy, Anchorage Farm Will Be Represented in Chicago

Pomeroy Farm of Cuba is a ship, long noted for champion breeding stock in hog class, enter the International Livestock Exposition to be held in Chicago from November 30 to December 1.

A group of Berkshire hogs entered in heavy medium light classes.

At the Illinois State grand championships were awarded in the Junior board pig and Age show class. A herd of hogs has been developed by A. C. Buehler, owner of Pomeroy Farm, for breeding purposes. This herd showed in the state fair this summer coming in Old Age, Senior, Junior Yearling Junior Board and Junior classes. A total of 27 champions, 17 firsts, 14 seconds, 10 thirds and 29 other places, awarded the herd.

Three other noted Lake County farms, Thomas E. Wills's, Elvin Farms near Waukegan; Elmer Farm at Libertyville; and property of William Bartholomew, of Chicago; and Anchor Farms at Barrington, owned by M. H. Karker also made up for the competitions of the International Live Stock Exposition in Chicago.

Kelley Farms will exhibit purebred shorthorns which have been leading winners at state fairs during the past two months. The 30 hogs shown will enter the classes for three sheep in which, in recent years their line has won many of the highest awards. At the 1934 international show, Kelley won the championship of the Ox ram classes and reserve champion on an ewe entry; and Anchor Farms have taken a first, a second and a third place in the Belgian draft horse tests.

The forthcoming exposition marks its 26th year since November 29 to December 7 as the city's foremost annual agricultural show. Secretary-manager H. H. Hilde reports a record entry for the fair that will be registered on the prize lists.

Growers from nearly all states in the union and provinces of Canada are sending entries to the International Show and show, the 17th to be held in connection with the livestock show.

It is announced that although the entry closing date for all stock classes, with the exception of carlot competitions, was November 16, farmers have until November 22 for the grain show and for the carlot contest of fat feeder cattle, sheep, and swine will be accepted until November 22, a week before the exposition opens.
