Hold Ski Meet at Fox River Grove Week From Sunday

Preparations are rapidly nearing completion for the thirtieth annual Norge ski tournament to be held at the Fox River Grove slide Sunday, Jan. 19, at which the nation's best jumpers will compete.

It appears that for the first time in five years the meet will be contested on Illinois snow. Since 1930 snow has been imported by train each year.

Alterations have been made to the giant slide which are expected to produce longer jumps. A ten-foot tower has been built on the top of the slide and the take-off has been shortened several feet. The landing hill has also been built to a slightly sharper angle.

By Sunday it is expected the slide will be in near perfect condition which would mark the first time in ten years that the Norge jumpers will be able to practice for the meet on the home slide.

Salem, St. Paul to Tangle in Church Cage Game Monday

Methodist Can Tie for League Lead by Defeating St. Anne Quintet

Church league basketball will be resumed Monday night when the final games of the first round are played at the high school gym.

St. Anne and the Methodists will meet in the opening game, with the old rivals Salem and St. Paul will clash in the second encounter. First game is to start at 7:30 p. m.

After Monday's battles, another complete round of four games for each team will be played in the process of deciding the 1935-36 league champion.

The church league race this season has developed into an open affair. Most of the games have been close and hard fought, outcomes usually decided in the final quarter.

Salem and St. Paul, who for three years dominated the league, are finding the going tough this season. Each has won one out of two and are grouped with St. Anne at the bottom of the ladder.

St. Paul has been weakened by the loss of Ray Wichman and Bob Wolf and its new combination has not clicked as yet. Salem's veteran five has had hard luck, dropping its close 22-19 decision to the Methodists.

The Baptist and Methodist quintets have shown marked improvement and are at the top of the heap—Baptists have won three out of four, and the M. E.'s two out of three. By defeating St. Anne Monday, the Methodists can tie the Baptists for first place.

Much of the Baptist's success is attributed to the presence of Al Heitman, a 6 ft. 4 in. center, in its lineup. The Methodists have been strengthened by four regulars from last season's champ high school team and the M. E.'s season defeat was by the Baptists 23-19. The Baptists only defeat was by St. Anne, 27-24.

Fish's 26 Million Eggs

The ling, the most prolific of food fishes, lays over 26,000,000 eggs during the spawning period, while the herring only averages 30,000. The ling is the second most prolific fish, averaging 8,000,000 eggs, while the cod comes next with 5,000,000. All this seems contradictory when one considers the millions of herrings landed annually compared with the number of other fishes. The reason is that all the eggs laid by these fish do not come to maturity. The eggs of the ling, for instance, float on the water and many are eaten by other fish. The herring's eggs sink and thus escape destruction.

"Eureka," Exclamation of Delight, Authority Says

The story concerning an ancient philosopher and the exclamation "Eureka," follows:

Eureka (Gr., more correctly Heureka)—I have found it! An exclamation of delight at the making of a discovery; originally that of Archimedes, the Syracuse philosopher, when he discovered how to test the purity of Hiero's crown. The tale is that Hiero delivered a certain weight of gold to a smith to be made into a vase crown, but suspected that the gold had been alloyed with an inferior metal, asked Archimedes to test it. The philosopher did not know how to proceed but, in stepping into his bath, which was quite full, observed that some of the water ran over. It immediately struck him that a body must remove its own weight of water when it is immersed; and would consequently remove more water. In this way he found that the crown was deficient in gold, and Hiero says: "When the idea flashed across his mind, the philosopher jumped out of the bath, exclaiming, 'Heureka! Heureka!'"
