January Bill at Catlow Has Many Stellar Pictures of Recent Issue

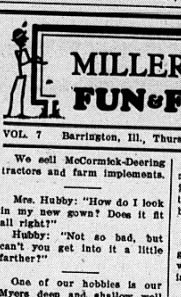

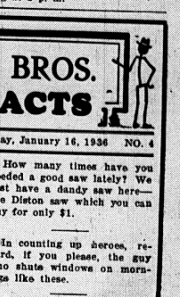
