Members and friends of the Barrington Woman's club had the pleasure of hearing a delightful talk by William Reichmann at the public library Thursday. He gave many true facts of conditions in Germany from where he has recently returned after a long visit.

First, Mr. Reichmann read us a paper he had prepared, "Who is Hitler and Why?" He answered innumerable questions on the state of affairs at the completion of his reading.

In his paper Mr. Reichmann said, "Hitler is dynamite and is liked and disliked by many. He is an Austrian from the Danube basin where for many years there has been a great deal of strife and racial fighting. He is emotional, receptive and his constant thought is Nationalism."

After the Great War there was a motley crowd of men in Germany who met in beer halls, indulged in street fights, and in general encouraged unrest. It was through the organizing of those men into his "brown shirts" that Hitler gained power with fiery oratory and hopes for a new future. At that time there were five distinct marching armies with a seeming revolt in progress, but Hitler organized them and trained them with an outdoor party.

Hitler reigns today because the people have a passion, for the union and racial unity which he has given them. Faith, hope and vigor are his points of unity.

The countries surrounding Germany and Germany itself are virtually a battle ground of races and the Nationalists are now trying to keep the unity that Hitler has established. The National Socialists are taking youths and training them in a manner similar to the boy scout movement in this country, but are drilling them in Nationalist principles.
