Fire of an unknown origin at the A. Brader farm, Long Grove, destroyed a one-half mile east of Barrington, caused the second of the week, when the Brader house caught fire shortly after 10 o'clock Wednesday and burned to the ground.

According to information received from the house filled with furniture, including a piano, a typewriter and a sewing machine, and a large amount of clothing and other household goods were thrown into the fire.

The fire started in the kitchen and spread rapidly to the living room and dining room. The fire department was called and the fire was extinguished after about 30 minutes.

The cause of the fire is still unknown. The insurance company is investigating the matter.
