**Closed State Bank Will Pay \$14,200 Out to Depositors**  
Five Per Cent Dividend Will Be Paid Friday or Saturday

A 5 per cent deposit distribution amounting to \$14,200 will be paid by check to persons holding deposit claims against the First State Bank of Barrington this week according to information received from Louis E. Nelson, deputy receiver under W. L. O'Connell, district receiver for the state bank. The checks will be mailed out either Friday or Saturday, depending on how quickly the necessary clerical work is completed.

The fourth dividend makes a total of 30 per cent which will have been returned to date. The last dividend was made July 1935 as a result of a loan from the reorganization finance corporation. The \$14,200 being paid out this week was raised by ordinary liquidation. Since the closing of the bank there have been two dividend payments of five per cent, one of them made last July, and now this one, making a total of 30 per cent.

Barrington public school and Dundee Community high school orchestras will present a combined concert at Barrington high school auditorium Tuesday evening, Jan. 20, under the direction of W. N. Songs by members of the Boys and Girls' Glee clubs under the direction of Miss Hazel Carter, and the Dundee school, and the Dundee high school, will add variety to the program.

After winning first place in the state contest, the Barrington orchestra won first place in class C of the national contest, conducted at Madison, Wis. Divisions were made in accordance with school enrollment.
