

"Captain Blood" Plays at Catlow Sunday, Monday

"The Bride Comes Home" With Claudette Colbert, Now on Screen

After several months spent in close study of the voices and diction of the screen's outstanding players, Phyllis Loughton, dramatic coach at Paramount studios, is back at her desk ready to advise the crop of new talent that has been signed for the coming year's productions.

Of all the players she studied, Miss Loughton said that Claudette Colbert is "the one who has the most perfect control of her voice and is understandable universally. The dramatic coach sat on the sidelines during most of the filming of Miss Colbert's latest picture, "The Bride Comes Home," which plays tonight and Friday at the Catlow theatre.

"Miss Colbert," she said, "is truly a remarkable person. She not only is a superb actress and a beautiful girl. Her sparkling voice seems to have been created for sound pictures."

Miss Loughton also praised the voices and diction of Joan Crawford, Gary Cooper, George Raft, Mae West, Leslie Howard, Joan Bennett and Frances Langford.

To be seen in "The Last Days of Pompeii," the latest attraction at the Catlow theatre Saturday, is the eruption of Vesuvius which, with the accompanying earthquake, completely demolished the classically beautiful Pompeii.

Both the eruption and destruction are said to be strikingly realistic, and the story of the last vivid years of the Roman city is based substantially upon authentic facts that were derived from extensive historical and archaeological research.

The entire picture was made in the Painted Desert and other beautiful Arizona locations often more than 112 miles from the railroad. Intense heat, with the thermometer reaching 131 degrees; blinding sandstorms, sudden cloudbursts which stalled sound trucks and cars in deep mud, a scarcity of palatable drinking water and the most severe physical discomforts were endured by players and crew.

Tuberculosis Association Examines 519 Persons in Lake County During 1935

In 1935, 519 examinations were given in 11 monthly chest clinics sponsored by the Lake County Tuberculosis Association. As a result of these examinations, 18 active cases of adult, pulmonary tuberculosis were discovered. Fifty-six others had been in contact with active cases of tuberculosis and were examined. Although these contact cases did not reveal the disease at the time of the examination, they must return for periodic check-ups. The other 445 came in to the clinic because they had one or more symptoms of the disease and needed a careful examination.

Anyone who has these symptoms should see his family physician immediately and find out what is wrong. Although the symptoms of tuberculosis are fairly well known, too often they are disregarded and dismissed as of slight importance. These symptoms are: loss of weight, too easily tired, indigestion, poor appetite and a cough that hangs on.

Supervisors of Lake County to Pay Wolf Bounty

Each Pelt Is Worth \$12 If It Is Brought to County Clerk

A decision of the board of supervisors in Lake county to pay a \$12 bounty for each wolf pelt captured in the county affords local hunters a money-making opportunity.

Instead of the proverbial "keep the wolf from the door," the better thought now might be to invite him in. The \$12 bounty will be paid on all wolves captured in the county and the regulation authorizing the payment is retroactive to December 1, 1935.

The persons claiming a bounty must present the scalp with the ears thereon not more than 60 days after the catch is made. The applicant will be made to swear by oath by the clerk of the county board that the conditions for a bounty as required have been done.

The board of supervisors reached their decision Tuesday, and Wednesday the first account of any damage by wild animals was reported.

What is presumed to be a wolf is blamed for the loss of five pigs killed, one carried away and seven pigs crippled on a farm owned by Charles Klein near Waukegan sometime Wednesday night.

Each year a number of wolves are reported and some have also been shot. As well as wolves attacking the position of a man, there has been some agitation for a bounty on fox killed in the county.

Severe winter weather and poor feeding grounds are suggested as the reason that foxes and wolves are driven into the more populated regions around here.

Sponsor Classes for Students in Safety Courses

Safe drivers of the 1940's are being trained in Illinois and Indiana high schools in comprehensive courses sponsored by the Chicago Motor Club.

Pupils of 150 of the schools are already studying preliminary material prepared by club safety engineers. This consists of examination sheets, a teacher's outline called "Sportsmanlike Driving," and a pamphlet containing answers and discussions of the examination questions.

"By the beginning of February," said George W. Barton, co-director of safety of the Chicago Motor Club, "51,000 examination papers, 1,200 copies of 'Sportsmanlike Driving,' and 600 answer pamphlets will be in the hands of high school teachers and pupils."

We are now writing more material on such subjects as the history of automobile transportation, its social and economic value, mechanics of operation, traffic laws and customs, and accident causes. Our drafts are being sent to Pennsylvania State college to a textbook writer, who is organizing them most effectively from the educational standpoint.

"Before the text goes to normal pupils, we are going to mail copies of it to leading colleges, normal school, and high school educators all over the country for criticism."

Students to a number of high schools will also be asked for their comments on how hard or easy it is. In preparing our preliminary pamphlets we used this system with satisfactory results.

"In addition to the test, we are working on a sort of laboratory manual for high schools, demonstrating how to apply what is taught to their own problems. Pupils learn how to set up a school traffic commission to pass and enforce safety rules for high school drivers and pedestrians alike. Pedestrian training, which is usually allowed to lapse after graduation from the grade school, is one of the suggested responsibilities of the commission."

"It is vital that safety instruction be extended to high school pupils," Mr. Barton said. "Their death rate has soared 130 per cent in two years. Sample examinations have shown that pupils get more careless as they grow older. The freshman still remembers his elementary school safety training, but in a year or two or three he begins to drive himself and patterns his habits on parents and other adults whose driving habits are often unsafe. By the time he is a senior, he may care little about the rights of others."
