Building Is Favorable in Suburban Regions Despite Winter Weather

Old Dorese broke up the procession of million dollar months which this survey of new building in the Chicago suburban region had marshalled since last March. This did not, however, keep the month of January from exceeding January 1935 by 172 per cent.

In the building field the new year seldom begins right, probably because outside building in January is usually all but impossible. Nevertheless, January 1936, though it fell far short of December with \$1,329,133 far outdistanced every January since 1932. Barrington had no permits issued during January for 1935 and 1936.
