

"Anything Goes" Stars Crosby and Merman at Catlow

"The Great Impersonation" Is Mystery Play Featuring Edmund Lowe

This friendship that proves it will under a hail of fire and in the face of gay adventure is the theme of the colorful and exciting "Professional Soldier," which closes tonight at the Catlow theatre, presenting Victor McLaglen and Fredrick Bartholomew in their first contrasting roles.

With a fascinating yarn for its basis, this grand adventure picture is the amazing story of a little king and a shattering storm of fortune who become pals in peril. E. Phillips Oppenheim is acknowledged to be the old master of mystery writers and "The Great Impersonation" is his masterpiece. The famous author revealed this fact when Universal was negotiating with him for the rights to his celebrated story, which comes Friday with Edmund Lowe starring in the dual title role.

Oppenheim, who has written over 100 best selling full length novels besides innumerable short stories in his forty odd years of fictionizing, prefers "The Great Impersonation" to anything he has written. He gives the story the highest rating on three counts—character, plot and action. "I have never appeared in a role that affected me as much as this in 'Transatlantic Tunnel,'" says Madge Evans, coming to the Catlow theatre Saturday.

Both is the wife of Engineer Mottish, played by Richard Dix. She sees her husband taken from her first by the pressure of a second in the great tunnel, and second by the allure of Variola, played by Helen Vinson. Parodies of "You're the Top," the song that made America "top" conscious, enliven the presentation of "Anything Goes," which comes Sunday and Monday. This comedy created a sensation on the New York stage during its long run there. Bing Crosby, who heads the cast, exchanges banter with Eichel Merman. Everything from a Gerishwin ditty to the Great Chinese wall is invoked to bring out the lighter side of "You're the Top" theme.

Others in the cast are Charley Huggles, Ida Lupino, and Grace Bradley.

Elmore Whitney and Tom Rennie head the cast of players in "Timothy's Quest," Paramount's adaptation of Kate Douglas Wiggin's well-known novel, which comes Tuesday.

Duke Moore, Virginia Wolfier, with Martin and Bonnie Barrett comprise the quartet of children who stir up excitement and trouble.

Weather Conditions Are Responsible for Drop in February Building Trade

The very nature of the month of February as far as weather conditions is a foregone conclusion that building activity in Barrington and the suburban area around Chicago would take a large drop in Barrington, as in the previous two months, no permits were issued by Herman Garbush, building commissioner, for new structures or remodeling work. Figures failed to mark the million dollars-a-month, with a large margin in the suburban area.

Barrington enjoyed a sustained movement of new building activity during 1935 but climatic conditions of January and February prevented an early start this year. Despite conditions, an increase of \$206,000 was noted in the suburban area over February of 1935. The figures to be compared are \$512,230 for February, 1935, and \$306,940 for February, 1932.

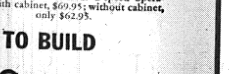
