Barrington Women's Club

The Public Health department of the Illinois Federation of Women's clubs is sponsoring an Intimate Day, March 26th, at the Rosewood Park Hotel. This will be an all-day meeting and a number of noted physicians will appear on the program which have been arranged by Helen M. Koerts, 7th District chairman, who is a doctor herself.

The Mayfair Woman's club extends to our members a cordial invitation to attend its regular meeting Monday, March 23 at 1:30 at the Mayfair Community house, 4559 Sheridan avenue.

A large group attended the study class last Thursday to hear Miss June Work review "An Introduction to Cultural Anthropology." Miss Work stated that Robert H. Lowie, the author, is well known for his work among the American Indians, and recommended the book for the general study of anthropology.

"Culture is not synonymous to any certain race," she said, "but each has made some distinct to our present culture. European culture was preceded by the high culture of the Orient, of India and of Egypt. Progress is not inevitable, and may be maintained only through labor."

Miss Work then said that anthropologists believe farming to be the outgrowth of food gathering, most of which was done by the women in the early tribes. The first truly domestic animal was the dog which was put to many uses, even being eaten by some tribes.

The prehistoric man of 50,000 years ago knew fire. He first importance was the protection against animals, then for warmth and preparation of food. Religion and magic in the early tribes were very closely interwoven. The primitive rules of marriages were strict ones, and the young couples invariably lived with the parents of one of them. Some groups had a distinct social class, the royalty being considered almost sacred. Many tribes studied the stars to know the seasons of the year. Some geographical knowledge as well as knowledge to cure disease and to heal wounds was necessary for their safety. The earliest tribes had their own knowledge it was never combined with that of others as we now have it and often was lost through lack of any method of writing.
