Three Projects in Lake County Are Approved by WPA

Three WPA construction projects which, if carried to completion, would necessitate an expenditure in federal funds totaling \$25,937 in Lake county were given initial allotments Monday. It was reported at the district office in Rockford. Work is expected to start within a short time on each project. Installation of two culverts on Fairfield road and grading and graveling of other roads not a part of the federal highway system in Elia township will begin shortly, officials stated. Total expenditures for road work is expected to reach \$6353. The other projects were in town near the east end of the county.

Set Hearing Date on Condemnation for Sewer

Continued from page 1. A defendant in the condemnation proceedings. He objected to the dumping plan on the ground that it would lower realty values and affect future property sales by having "sewer rights" attached to the site. He stated that if the effluent were released in Pilot creek at the treatment plant all property would be affected to an equal degree. Village Attorney Maloney reviewed the steps leading up to the plans as adopted. He stated that the topographical nature of Pilot creek made the change necessary. Due to the fact that water will "pond" at points above the North-west highway, the village would face possibility of litigation for many years if the effluent and storm waters flowed into the creek at the same place. By segregating the two, he stated, those below Northwest highway would benefit from an underground sewer system and clear surveillance of the state sanitary water board. The check maintained by that body, Mr. Maloney stated, would insure property owners of a definite means of forcing the village to keep close check on the operations of the treatment plant. The cost of the outfall sewer was estimated at \$36,000. In reaching a decision to install the pipe line, village trustees compared the cost of condemnation, future litigation and bonds incurred by the village. Their final decision was based on the fact that costs of both plans were nearly the same but the construction of the outfall line was more desirable.
