

Dog Owners of Suburban Area Prepare Entries for Prize Exhibit

Chicago Kennel Club Has Annual Show April 3-5

A. H. Stewart, Local Fancier of Terriers, Is Head of Event

Suburban fanciers of pedigree dogs will play a prominent part in the 35th annual all-breed show of the Chicago Kennel club to be held at the Coliseum in Chicago, April 3-5. It is stated by Alexander H. Stewart of Barrington, president of the club, all leading kennels and scores of home where registered dogs are kept as pets will be represented. Entries are being received at the Kennel club office at 5 N. Wabash avenue.

Cash, trophies and other awards, approximating \$5,000, will be distributed among the winners. Chief award is the club's John C. Eastman Memorial Trophy valued at \$1000 for the blue-blooded dog selected as best in show regardless of breed. At last year's show the award went to a wire haired fox terrier owned by Philip R. Brand of Pasadena, Calif.

Among the donors of prizes is the American Kennel club. The club is offering \$250 to the American-bred dog or bitch winning the most group classes during the year; \$50 to the dog or bitch winning best in show; \$25 to the dog or bitch winning a group class and an additional \$10 to any dog or bitch winning any of the above classifications.

Special prizes are being offered for 30 specialty clubs and numerous individuals have put up awards of various kinds.

More than 1000 dogs, representing some 40 breeds, from the leading kennels of the country and Canada as well as from honorees, will fight it out for points and prizes it is indicated, Mr. Stewart stated. The breeds to be shown range all the way from toy dogs standing little more than wrist high and weighing a scant three pounds to giants ranging up to 200 pounds with a measurement of seven feet.

Baptists Elect by Defending Champion in Elgin Church Tourney

The remaining schedule for the meet, which is being sponsored by the Elgin Y.M.C.A. in the "Y" gym, includes quarter-final games, tonight; semi-finals, Friday night; and finals, Saturday night.
