Track and Field Events Will Be Coached by P. Clark and R. Kennedy

Forty-five candidates for the Broncho team have signed up with Coach Paul Clark and R. Kennedy, who will assist in coaching of the Barrington high school. Workouts are being held through the countryside and in the gymnasium on the cinders in actual track.

With a large squad to work with the coaches have an excellent opportunity to produce point athletes in many events. The boys have competed various events and to present a well-balanced group of competitors.

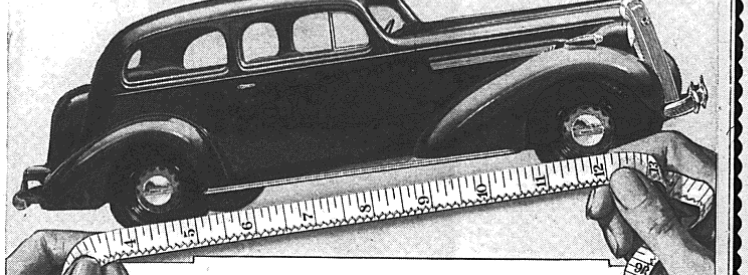
