of Building Group**

V. H. Lageschulte, of Lageschulte and Hager company, is attending a two-weeks merchandising conference at which plans are being discussed to stimulate the building trades and employment in Barrington. The conference started March 16 and will close March 28.

Mr. Lageschulte, with more than 100 other building material dealers and their managers from the midwest states, is studying the new development in building industry merchandising so that he may analyze local market conditions with a view to organizing a housing guild in Barrington. Membership in the guild, which is to be organized by John Hanlon, would include contractors, architects, real estate men, financing agencies, etc.

It is planned that these guilds will be set up throughout the country as the first step in a campaign which will eventually be successfully used in the automobile, radio, home appliance and similar industries may be applied in the home building and modernization fields. This would include full utilization of the single mortage plan of the Federal Home Loan Bank under which, after a down payment, a person may pay for a house on monthly installments and own it outright as the end of not more than 20 years.






