### Maximum Poor Tax to Be Voted on at Meeting April 7

Supervisor Urges Voters to Attend Annual Barrington Town Meeting

"A matter of vital interest to all taxpayers will be considered at the annual town meeting of Barrington township next Tuesday, April 7, and it will be to the taxpayers' interests to be present," V. D. Hawley, town supervisor, reported Wednesday.

The Illinois emergency relief commission will cease to function in rural townships of Cook county July 1, 1936, and all relief aid that date will be taken care of by the townships through the supervisors as a result of legislation passed at the last session of the general assembly.

"The interpretation of the law is to the effect that each township must levy a maximum tax before state aid will be allowed. This maximum taxation is set at 30c per \$100 assessed valuation."

"Therefore, it is urged that all taxpayers be present at the above mentioned meeting at 2 p. m. at the village hall to express their wishes by voting on this matter," Mr. Hawley added.

### Community Fire Truck Answers Two Calls for Prairie Fires This Week

Prairie fires that threatened damage to private property were responsible for two alarms which were answered by the community fire department this week.

The first was made Thursday afternoon when a large section of land in Barrington township west of the village limits along county line was being burned off. ### Annual Reports of Barrington, Cuba Towns Published

The annual treasurers' reports of Barrington and Cuba towns are published this week by V. D. Hawley and Harold Kelsey, respective supervisors of the towns.

In the town of Barrington, receipts for the road and bridge fund were \$10,144.89 while expenditures were \$8193.56, leaving a balance on hand of \$1951.33. Receipts for the general fund were \$6364.87 and disbursements \$18,010.01, leaving a balance of \$4,483.86.

In the town of Cuba there was \$7439.55 in receipts for the road and bridge and gravel fund with expenditures totaling \$7419.49, or a balance of \$20.06. The general town fund received \$5411.72 and \$4130.52 was paid out, leaving a balance of \$1291.20. The Cuba town fund account opened \$2013.39 while receiving \$2068.59, with a cash reserve of \$55.20.

The annual reports will be discussed at meetings of both towns Tuesday, April 11. The town of Barrington will meet at 2 p. m. at Schaubel Bros. and Collins garage, 125 of Cook street.

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### Village Presents Sewer Experts in Condemnation Suit

Case Adjoined Until Friday After Three Days of Testimony

A hearing of condemnation proceedings involving the village of Barrington and owners of property along Flint creek north of the Northwest highway has been in progress in circuit court of Lake county since Monday. The jury was impaneled Monday afternoon and then taken on an inspection tour of the land through which the creek flows.

The case involves the village, presented testimony from Tuesday morning until Wednesday afternoon, when the case was adjourned until Friday morning, April 5.

The testimony to-date has concerned the plans, specifications and engineering data on the new treatment plant to be built. D. B. Maloney, village attorney, is representing Barrington and J. H. Kallis is the associate lawyer handling the defendants case with the law firm of Bunyard and Bennett.

Bartrand village clerk, A. Conover village engineer, J. H. Blanke village trustee and chairman of the sewer committee, G. B. Rowman bacteriological expert, have taken the witness stand for the village.

The condemnation case is being fought for flowage rights for the village of Barrington in Flint creek. The village seeks the right to employ treated sanitary sewage in the creek at the point where the creek flows under the Northwest highway.

The defendants have asked for \$120,000 for the condemnation. Some time ago the village made an offer of about \$1700 for the rights.
