

Frederick Hodgdon Awarded 3rd Prize for House Design

Receives \$500 for Entry in
Portland Cement
Competition

An entry by Frederick Hodgdon, a prominent local architect, in the Portland Cement association architectural competition awarded third best of 1521 designs entered in the contest.

Announcement of his award accompanied by a check for \$500 was received this week from Russell C. Whitehead, editor of Portland Cement, the trade journal sponsored the competition.

The design was drawn for construction by a group of well-known architects. Judging was done by a committee of architects.

The design was designed by Mr. Hodgdon as a two-story concrete house of six rooms and attached garage. The basement was included in the design.

Estimated cost of the structure was \$10,000. The design was studied by the Portland Cement Association of Chicago and Europe as a traveling representative of the Chicago Architectural Club.
