Townships Levy for Tax Collections at Annual Meetings

Barrington and Cuba Groups Meet Tuesday With Yearly Reports

Passing of tax levies for Barrington and Cuba townships were major items of importance when the respective bodies met Tuesday afternoon. The meetings were held for the purpose of reading annual reports and levying funds for future expenditures.

In Barrington township only one levy was made. The town fund levy for \$4000 was approved and passed. The maximum figure of \$27.50 was deferred until a later date. Road and bridge levies for both townships will not be made until fall.

Cuba township levied a town fund levy of \$3050 and a poor fund of \$4500. The Board of Supervisors also levied \$2000. Barrington township is placed in a difficult financial position with the enactment of recent state legislation on the handling of relief cases. A law passed by the general assembly placed all relief cases under the supervision of the IERC, which formerly handled relief cases on its own.

It now becomes necessary for Barrington township to levy a tax to cover the cost of relief cases. It has been estimated that approximately 40 or 50 relief cases are on the rolls from Barrington township. An allotment of \$27.50 a month to each case, the relief total is placed at \$16,000 a year.

In order to obtain assistance from the occupational tax fund, it is mandatory by law that the township levy a maximum figure of 36c on the 1910 valuation. The levy was made and it would not be possible to receive that money until a slow tax collection in Cook county, for approximately 18 months. Where funds would come from during that time is the problem facing the township.

Electors of Barrington township did not levy any money for relief work in the hope that a change would be made in the law by July 1. If necessary a special meeting will be called before that time to have a vote on the levy in accordance with the wishes of the taxpayers.

Many Candidates Compete for Jobs of Committeemen

Precinct Posts Interest Large Group in Barrington, Elia and Cuba

Keen interest is developing in the party committeemen elections in Barrington, Cuba and Elia townships. With the exception of the Democratic party, a floor show is filed for each office on both the Democratic and Republican tickets.

Herb Sott is being opposed by Dr. Albert Gieske for the position of Barrington township committeeman. Mr. Sott is at present a precinct committeeman but a recently enacted law will abolish the precinct jobs and establish township committeemen following election in Barrington township one man will replace three in each party. This new law affects only Cook county.

Howard R. Brinlinger is opposed by George Warner on the Democratic ticket. Rudolph L. Ditzel is opposed for the office of precinct committeeman in Cuba township. He is the endorsed candidate of the Cuba township republican club and a supporter of Harold Kelsey, candidate for nomination as Lake county coroner.

The Democratic battle in Cuba township will carry names of five candidates. Leo LaPointe, John Truett, William M. Gallagher and Chris Heckmiller are candidates who are supporting Governor Henry Horner in the primary election. Andrew M. Dovers is the fifth candidate and is supporting Herman N. Bundeness, also a candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor of Illinois.

Elia township has three candidates running for the republican nomination for state's attorney. Walter H. Prehm and Irving C. Descauser, Ferguson Harkness are the only candidates for the Democratic office. Competition is running strong in Elia township to gather voters into the republican party folds.

In the majority of cases there has been no outward display of friction between candidates in the district.

Election Interest Centers on Both Governor Battles

Horner Versus Bundeness; Brooks Against Field Next Tuesday

A state and county political campaign which is without precedent in this district for the interest it has aroused will culminate in the primary election next Tuesday. Although fundamentally a republican stronghold, the Barrington, Lake Zurich, and Palatine district has felt the democratic campaign waged by the two democratic candidates for governor who at the same time being responsive to the competition within the G.O.P. ranks.

One possible cause for confusion will be the hours the polls will be open from 6 a. m. to 5 p. m. The time of day may vary. The attorney general ruled that the zone time in effect at each place shall be official regardless of the election. The village of Barrington is officially on daylight saving (Eastern Standard Time) but the territory is not. According to official information, the following precincts (given with polling places) will employ the time as follows:

Cuba (Schubel Brothers and Collins garage, 124 North Cook street) 6 a. m. to 5 p. m. C.S.T. Barrington precinct 1 (Berg's garage, 110 E. Station street) 6 a. m. to 5 p. m. E.S.T. Barrington precinct 2 (Barrington Center) 6 a. m. to 5 p. m. C.S.T.

Barrington precinct 3 (village hall, South Hough street) 6 a. m. to 5 p. m. E.S.T. Elia (town hall, Lake Zurich) 6 a. m. to 5 p. m. C.S.T.

The above time schedule for voting are based on the latest information available; but all voters regardless of the precinct in which they live will do well to check the time information about the day before election. The confusion which developed when Chicago adopted Eastern standard time may cause some persons to vote at an incorrect hour.

Although there is considerable interest in county and legislative campaigns, the party nominations for governor, governor-elect, and all other offices, are the angle of the primary.

In the republican party, it is C. E. Wayland Brooks against the field of republican candidates. The republican party will do well to check the time information about the day before election.
