

**Harold D. Kelsey Stresses Campaign on Safety Program**

Believing that he faithfully had tried to explain his platform as a republican candidate for county coroner, Harold D. Kelsey, of Barrington, is closing his campaign and planned to give the few remaining days to the routine business of getting the voters to the polls.

My belief is that a coroner can save lives as well as prevent any impact to determine the cause of death. I am certain that the death rate in the county can be cut by making this a full time office so that traffic hazards, railway crossings, bad highway grades and intersections can be studied and eliminated by the bringing of plans for changes to the proper authorities," Mr. Kelsey declared.

The present coroner's law goes back to 1879. It should be brought up to 1936 and I believe in this. I will give full time to the office with this aim in mind that Lake county can be pointed out as pioneering in modern government to meet present-day needs. Recommendations to legislators on amendments to the law would bring it up from 1879 to 1936. If it can't be done, I will strap the office and let the sheriff handle the work of coroner as the antiquated act is of no value to this century and becomes an additional tax burden. But it can be an important and vital office if modernized," Mr. Kelsey declared.

He has pledged economy and his record shows that when he was chairman of the county board, supervisors in 1934 the Lake county debt was reduced slightly more than \$390,000 in one year.

When the state's attorney reaches the point that he does not choose to do his duty he should resign from office."

HUGE SUMS of money are being spent in an effort to re-elect Mr. Mason. However, HARRY A.
