Proclamation

In harmony with a custom of progressive American communities of conducting civic clean-up drives, the Village of Barrington, by order of its president and board of trustees, will set aside one week for its citizens to cooperate in a general and concentrated tidying up campaign. Village streets and parkways are now being torn up in an extensive sewerage system rebuilding program which will detract from the usual tidy appearance of Barrington next summer. For this reason it is especially desirable that attention be given our homes and lawns this spring. By cooperating in a cleanup campaign this spring, citizens living in the village will help to offset the unfavorable appearance which will result later from the construction program. In order that this program may be carried out to the best advantage, I designate the week of May 4 to 9 as cleanup week in Barrington. During that time, residents may place their cans and other rubbish in boxes and bags on the parkways to be picked up by village workers and trucks May 8 and 9 and hauled away. Aches and large articles such as automobile fenders and bodies will not be picked up and hauled away. I hereby urge that all residents cooperate wholeheartedly in this campaign to give Barrington the best possible appearance.

Lake and Cook County and State Winners Are Listed

While the victory of C. Wayland Brooks for republican nomination and Henry Horner for democratic nomination for governor overshadowed in popular interest all other results of the primary Tuesday, several close races for less important nominations kept telephone, newspaper and radio boys disseminating information Tuesday night, Wednesday and Thursday morning.

15 Lake county the neck and neck race for republican nomination for state's attorney was of special interest. Early Thursday morning Charles Mason, present state's attorney, was claiming victory by 26 votes while his opponent Harry Hall was claiming victory by 47 votes. Charles H. Francis of McHenry was in second place in the race for republican nomination for two state legislators from the eighth district, but Nick Keller of Warburg was close enough to hope for victory. Dick Lyons of Libertyville was way out in front with almost every vote to give him a majority over all of his five opponents.
