Plan Five Sessions at Scout Cabin to Create Local Interest

Persons interested in scouting as well as those wishing to become better acquainted with the movement will have an opportunity to study the many phases of work at a special training course to be started this evening, April 16, at the scout cabin under the direction of Donald E. Ryger, scout executive.

The course will be known as "A Boy's Eye View of Scouting" and will run for five consecutive meetings. The purpose of the course is to present a general outline of scouting, organization, principles, objectives and program. Classes will begin at 7:45 p. m. and the date for them are April 15, April 22, April 29, May 6 and May 14.

The meetings will be open to the public, and particularly to those not associated with the scouting program in Barrington. At the monthly meeting of scout executives held last Thursday the leaders expressed a wish that more local persons would become interested in the idea of doing actual service work.

A board of review will be held Tuesday, April 22, and a court of honor will follow on May 6, both events starting at 8 p. m. Troop 24 will be host on both occasions at the scout cabin.

According to W. R. Chapel, merit badge counselor, this will be the last court of honor and board of review prior to the closing of school. He has urged all scouts to prepare for advancement on May 6.
