

Charlie Chaplin Coming to Catlow in "Modern Times"

Famous Comedian of Silent
Screen Returns in Great
Comedy Hit

Throughout the entire month world wide fame is well known as Charlie Chaplin's, and no film are so eagerly awaited as those in which he is starred.

After an absence of nearly four years Chaplin returns to the screen in his new production, "Modern Times," written and directed by himself. It is scheduled for screening at the local theatre Sunday matinee and evening, Monday and Tuesday nights.

The story strikes an ultra-modern note with Chaplin as a mechanic among the huge wheels, dynamos, whirling belts, giant presses and drills of a 20th century steel plant. This environment offers entirely new comedy situations for the little man with the big nose and baggy trousers.

Faustine Goddard, Charlie's new leading lady, plays the romantic role while Chester Conklin and Hank Mann, associated with Chaplin in former comedies, have important roles in this film.

Immediately following "Modern Times" will be the new comedy, "The Ghost Goes West," which is being shown on Thursday.

The brilliant Robert Donat is seen both as Donald Glouie, an impoverished young Scotch highlander who is forced to sell his haunted ancestral castle to an American millionaire and also as the personable shade who strolls the castle halls.

Tonight and Friday will bring to a close the screening of "The Trail of the Lonesome Pine." This picture was filmed largely outdoors in natural color, and is heralded as a production of outstanding beauty. Sylvia Sydney, Hendy Ponda and Fred MacMurray are starred.

Crashing to a new high in amazing adventure, and presenting a most unusual tale, "Tough Guy," a startling story of the secret service, comes to the Catlow screen Saturday night.
